

The prisoner's wife, who sat at the table with his attorneys, bowed her head and sobbed quietly as the court head and sobbed quietly as the court pronounced sentence. Frank stood erect and svoke clearly when asked if erect and svoke clearly when asked if he had anything to say why sentence should not bepassed. He declared he had absolutely no gullty knowledge of the crime for which he was convicted, and asserted the evidence conclusively proved he is innocent adding that his trust was in God, who knows his protestations of innocensation to the truth.
