REGRET DEPARTURE DR. AND MRS. VINES

CONGREGATION FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH ADOPTED RESOLUTIONS

SUNDAY MORNING

Appreciation of Splendid Services of Dr. and Mrs. Vines is Expressed.

Resolutions expressing appreciation of the services rendered the First Baptist church and this community by the Rev. John F. Vines, D. D., and Mrs. Vines, and voicing the regret of the congregation that this beloved pastor has tendered his resignation, were adopted Sunday morning by the congregation of the First Baptist church, at a meeting held after the regular services.

The resolutions which were drawn up by a committee consisting of Messrs. C. B. Earle, T. Allen and R. R. King, read as follows:

Whereas, our beloved pastor, Dr. John F. Vines, who has served us for seven years so loyally, unreservedly and efficiently—fervently and fervently and fearlessly preaching the gospel and effectively practicing what he preached—has announced his intention to leave us June first, to assume the duties of another field;

And whereas, such announcement from him has brought to us, his congregation, the keenest regret—at the same time bringing us to a deep appreciation of his most splendid, loyal and effective labors in our midst, during his fruitful pastorate;

And whereas, Mrs. Vines, through her untiring and unselfish service, and devotion to the cause of the church, has endeared herself to our people;

Now, therefore, be it resolved, By the congregation of the First Baptist church, of Anderson, That the resignation of Dr. Vines, tendered after mature deliberation on his part but against the wishes of his congregation, be and the same is hereby accepted, in the spirit in which it was offered.

Resolved further, That in the resignation of Dr. Vines and in his and Mrs. Vines' departure from our community—our church, our new college which he has served so well as president and otherwise, and the whole community have suffered a delectable loss; and we wish hereby to express our keen sorrow and regret that the tie which for seven years has so strongly bound pastor and people is now to be broken; and to go on record also in an expression of our deep and sincere appreciation of the invaluable services rendered by Dr. and Mrs. Vines to our church, our college, our city and our community;

That we especially and emphatically endorse and commend the fearless warfare which Dr. Vines has relentlessly waged against sin in all its forms while serving this church; and that we recognize with gratitude the wholesome, far-reaching results of his labors in this direction. We felicitate the people whose pastor he is to become, and pray that his work in the new field may be attended with the splendid success which has marked his labors in Anderson.

Resolved further, That these resolutions be inscribed upon the minutes of the church, and that a copy of same be given to Dr. and Mrs. Vines.

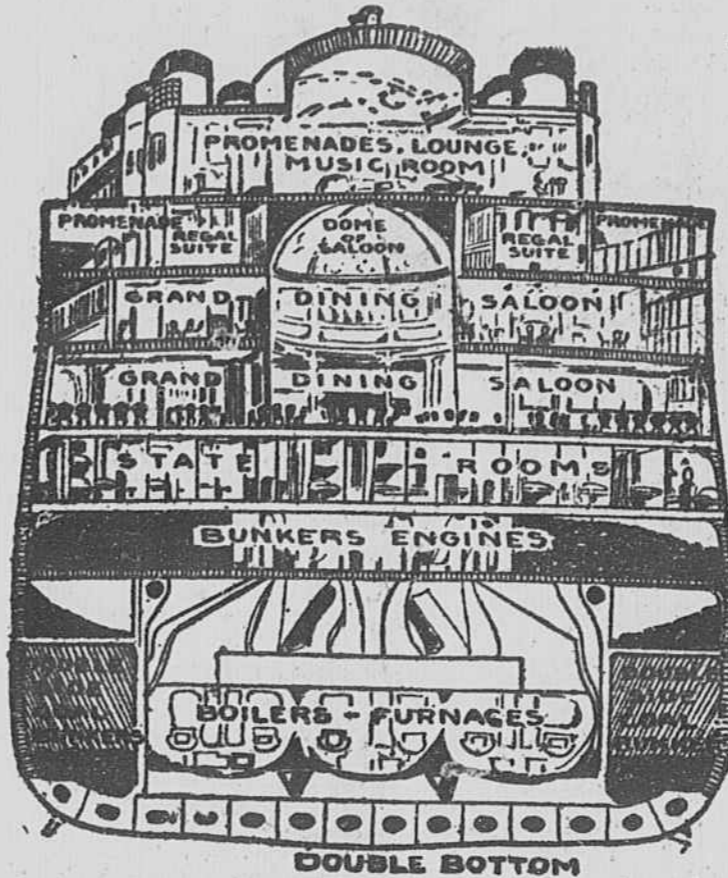
