Military Radio Equipment Carried on Motorcycle.

Designed particularly for military purposes in the field, a combination wireless-telephone and telegraph equipment has been developed which is carried in a side-car compartment attached to a motorcycle. The apparatus is compact, portable, and is claimed to have a telegraphic transmitting radius of approximately 100 miles, and a telephonic range of about half that distance. Both of the sending instruments are actuated by a high-voltage direct current supplied by a dynamo which is driven by a separate motorcycle engine mounted in the side compartment. The June Popular Mechanics Magazine contains a picture of the machine and wireless apparatus.
