Doty of the Winnsboro mili-tia company telephoned to Columbia for ammunition, saying that his sup-ply was short. Upon orders from the governor's office Major J. Shapter Caldwell left Columbia at 11:25 with 3,000 rounds of ammunition. He was accompanied by a details of 10 men to keep the mob from seizing the am-munition.

Aé report from Winnsboro this af-ternoon said that the sheriff and his 20 deputies ha djust arrived at the court house when a small mob gan firing into the crowd. The deputies returned fire.
