Washington, June 23.—The appeintment of Robert Lansing as secretary of state was announced at the white house early tonight. The statement issued said: Before leaving this evening for a brief rest in New Hampshire, President Wilson announced that he had offered the post of secretary of state to Robert Lancing, the present counsellor of the state department, and that Mr. Lansing had accepted the appointment.

Mr. Lansing has been acting secretary of state since W. J. Bryan resigned. He is a son-haw of former Secretary John W. Poster. He became counsellor to the department on the retirement of John Bassett Moore and has been openly regarded as the president's mainstay on questions of international law and on all difficult diplomatic accounts which has been thrust on the United States by the European war. His home is in Watertown, New York. He is fifty years of age.

Mr. Lausing was counsel for the United States in 1892 in the Behring Sea arbitration and later solicitor for the Alaskaa boundary tribunal. In 1999 he became counsel in the North Atlantic coast fisheries case at The Hagie, He is recognized as an authority on international law, being associate editor of the American Journal of Enternational Law.
