## Greatest Revival Has Come to Close

### BEST EVER HELD IN STATE AND PROBABLY GREATEST IN THE SOUTH

### CONVERSATIONS 3,500

Meeting Last Night Was Farewell  
 Service and Was Well Attended  
 by Many People of City.

One of the best and probably the greatest evangelistic meeting ever held in the South came to a close last night in Anderson. The number of those who have professed to be converted in this meeting amounts to approximately 3,500. Last night approximately \$600 were raised which with the amount already given amounts to \$1,350. This does not include the money raised for incidental expenses and goes as a free will offering to the evangelist.

The meeting last night was held as a farewell service and the large tent was filled to overflowing. The services were opened by Rev. J. W. Speake, who spoke of the great good the evangelist had accomplished in Anderson for all the churches, for the city and for this section of the state as a whole.

Rev. E. W. Thresher Dodge was the next speaker and he testified to the good works of Rev. Baxter F. McLendon for him and for the people of his church.

Mr. Charles S. Sullivan then arose and after a few appropriate remarks told of an incident that has happened since the meeting has been in progress. He said that a young man with whom he had had some differences about five years ago had come and apologized and had asked that he forget the past troubles and live in the future as if nothing had ever happened. This alone, he stated, had meant a blessing for him from the services.

Major J. H. Godfrey was the next speaker and he told of how he once knew Mr. McLendon in Bennettsville and what a change had come over him. He told of the great good accomplished in the city and then of the gold knife which had been presented to the evangelist by the members of the Anderson fire department. He also called attention to a handsome filled fountain pen which the barbers of the city had given to Mr. McLendon. He stated that he thought it the greatest privilege of his life to stand as mayor of the city where the evangelist had held his greatest meeting.

Sheriff Ashley was then called upon and he stated that the preaching of the evangelist had brought him to a realization of his duties and its privileges.

Rev. Sam Danner then arose and told of how long he had been knowing Mr. McLendon, of his sincerity in his passion for his work and of the great good he was accomplishing in this world. He spoke of the admiration which the evangelist had won for himself by his open way of attacking sin and by his not being a respecter of persons.

The choir and large audience then joined in singing "O Happy Day," after which Mr. R. E. Ligon was called upon to present a subject which had been neglected in the meeting.

This was that of the contributions that had been given the evangelist and Mr. Ligon stated that the people of Anderson had not begun to express their appreciation to the evangelist in the money they had given him. He called on as many as would

give \$5 in the audience to stand and quite a number arose. From \$5 it went to \$2.50 and on down. A great many of the classes in the Sunday schools, the aid societies, etc., gave five and ten dollars, the Ligon Bible class of St. John's Methodist church pledging itself to \$100 through Mr. R. S. Ligon. Large contributions came from numerous other sources, the doffer boys as a whole of two of the cotton mills subscribing \$5 apiece.

After this was done the ushers went through the congregation taking up a collection and quite a neat sum was raised in this manner. A great many of those who subscribed amounts did not pay it last night and it was stat-

ed that these subscriptions might be left with Mr. Charles S. Sullivan at Sullivan Hardware company.

After this part of the service was over the evangelist arose to say a few words in farewell. He stated that words would never express his appreciation and friendliness he felt for the people of Anderson and that he had grown to love the mso much that it was exceedingly painful for him to tear himself away from the place where he had held his greatest and best meeting. He stated that while he had been in this city he had let God use him the best he knew how and that he had preached the Bible as he saw it. He thanked the people for their cooperation and said that he had been deeply touched by the support which he had received generally from the people of Anderson. In speaking of the fountain pen and the knife he had received, he said that he would write many notes for sermons with the pen and with the knife he would scratch out the mistakes he would make in writing these. He said that he fully appreciated both gifts and commanded the members of the fire department and the barbers for their manly support. He thanked the mayor for his support and for the cooperation he had given him in making the meeting a success.

The evangelist stated that when the true accounts came out in the newspapers of the city in reference to the meeting, the people of the city would realize that they had had one of the greatest meetings ever held and that a tremendous amount of good had been accomplished. He apologized for anything that he had said that ought not to have been said if it hurt anyone's feelings but stated that if it was something that he should have said, he had no apologies to make. He stated that the citizenship of Anderson county would stand for nobler and higher things in the future and that in no way had he been disappointed with the results of his campaign for God.

In closing he stated that he wanted to meet all Jews and Gentiles, all Methodists, Baptists, Presbyterians, Episcopalians, Christians and those of other denominations in Heaven, and that he had done his best to win souls to Christ. He then told a story of how a Gypsy boy had tried to save his mother from drowning but she would not let him, and of how the next day at the funeral the boy had talked to his dead mother and told her that he had made every effort to save her and she would not let him. He stated that some of the people of Anderson would stand at the judgment bar of God some day and would remember how he had done his best for them and had tried to save them but they would not let him.

The evangelist then gave his last invitation to those who wished to take Christ as their Saviour and several score went to the front and grasped his hand.

Then an invitation was given to those who wanted to meet him in Heaven and would live in the future so that this would be possible. No sooner had he said the words than hundreds rushed down the aisles and climbed over the benches to get to the front and shake the evangelist's hand.

It was a sad and yet a sweet occasion and one that will be remembered by all who were present, and one that will be told for many years to come to the future generations of Anderson.


