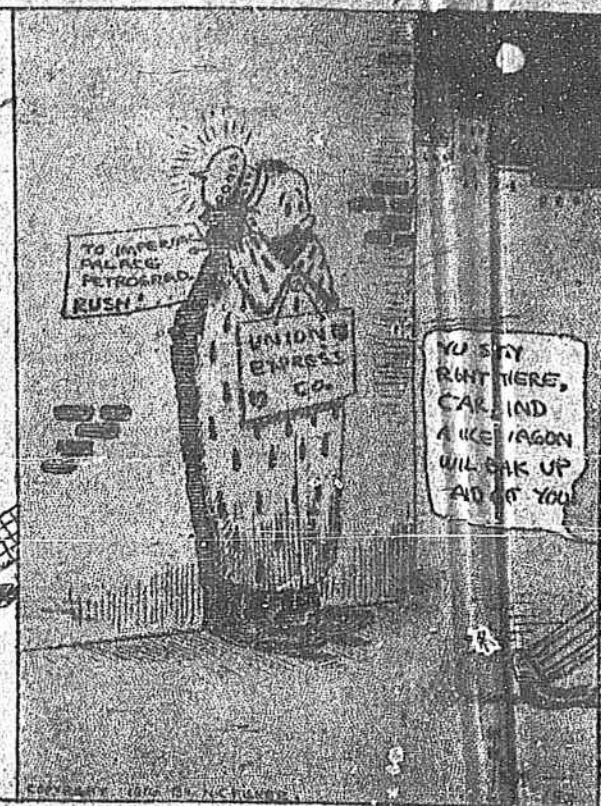
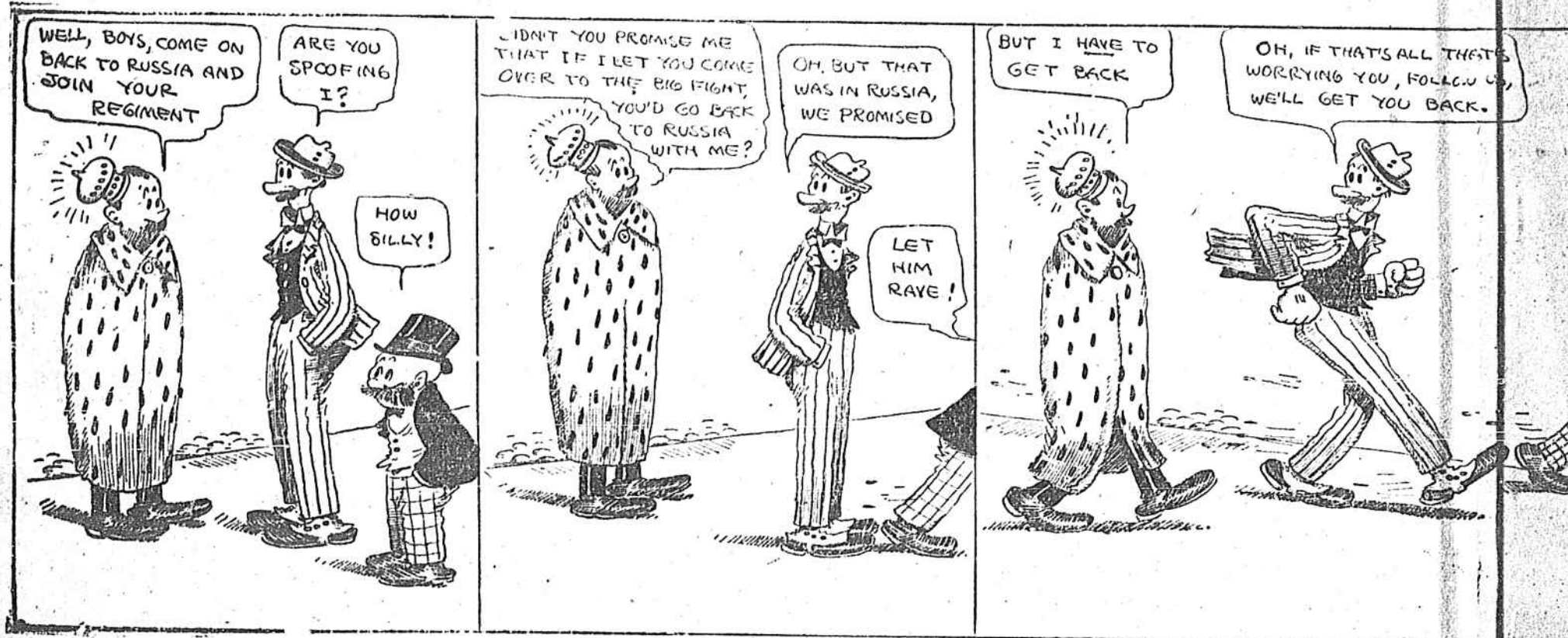

PUBLIC UTILITIES TO INSTALL A GAS PLANT ON P. & N.

Greenville, March 31.—Z. V. Taylor, of Charlotte, president of the Southern Public Utilities company, was in Greenville Thursday afternoon on special business and while here he announced that the company had made the necessary arrangements to install a modern coke gas plant on the Piedmont & Northern railway, near the outskirts of Greenville, back of the Southern railway depot. The plant, completely installed and ready for operation, will represent an outlay of \$45,000, said Mr. Taylor.

The new plant has been ordered from a Northern corporation and the parts are now being manufactured, according to latest advices. The company plans to have it running regularly by the first of June.

Many Join Navy. Atlanta, March 31.—The navy recruiting station in the federal building in Atlanta will be among the leaders of the nation when the next official report is received from the war department. Never before has there been such a brisk run of applicants. Many of the recruits are sent to the training school at Norfolk.

The enlistments show that Atlanta leads the country, with Dallas, Texas a close second. Cincinnati came third, Boston fourth and New York fifth.

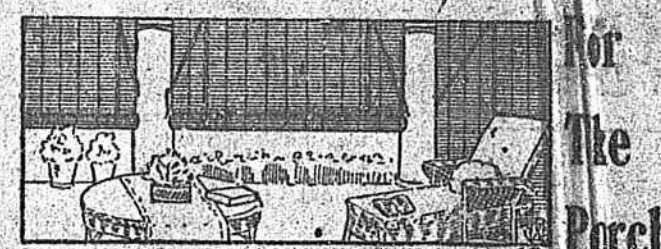
