She never complained, but bore her afflictions with true Christian fortitude.

At the early age of twelve years she had surrendered her heart and soul to the Master, and has since lived a consistent and truly useful Christian life.

She was before her marriage a McAllister and was united in marriage to Mr. Samuel R. Timms in 1882 and was the mother of ten children. She is survived by her husband, her four sons, J. Richard, Samuel L., Guy and Lester Timms and by three daughters, Mrs. Dollie Sherman of Piedmont, and Misses Minnie and Lorena Timms. She is also survived by her father, Mr. James McAllister of Liberty, S. C., and by four brothers, W. L., Allen M., Warren and Dayton McAllister, as well as by three sisters, Mrs. Emma Richey, Mrs. Lizale Carlee and Mrs. Dora Timms, practically all of whom reside in this county.

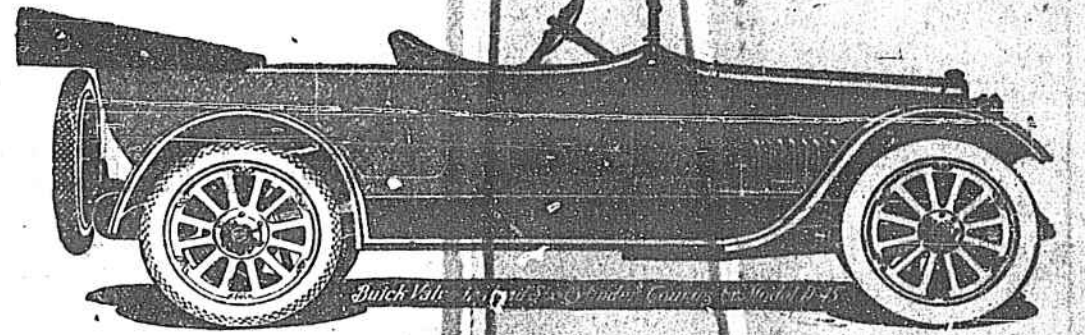
