WITH WOUND IN LEG VILLA IS BELIEVED HIDDEN IN DESERT

Bandit Chieftain Reported in Helpless Condition
in Secret Spot in Mexican Wilderness—
Dodd's Cavalry Making Desperate Pursuit

PERSHING'S FORCE IS SPEEDING
TOWARD SCENE OF RECENT ROUT

Credence is Now Given Report That Villa's Leg
Was Shattered in Battle With Carranza
Garrison at Guerrero.

Guerrero, Mexico, April 1.—Villa has lost his leg. Municipal president of the town of Temosachio, Chihuahua, reports that Villa was so badly wounded in the attack recently made on the Carranza garrison at Guerrero that his leg was amputated.

Columbus, New Mexico, April 1.—Reports from Pershing's headquarters today indicate that Pershing himself is speeding from Nampulqui toward the scene of Dodd's battle to direct the pursuit. Dodd's four hundred cavalymen are riding in desperate pursuit of the bandits. Although no reports came through from Dodd today, army officers here doubt that Villa was with his men at San Geronimo ranch when the battle occurred. One report given credence was, that Villa suffered a wound which broke his leg and shattered his hip in an attack on the Carranza Garrison at Guerrero, March twenty-seventh. From Guerrero he is said to have been carried away to a secret hiding place in the wilderness of that section.

PERSHING SAYS LITTLE
CHANCE VILLA ESCAPING

(By Associated Press.)
San Antonio, April 1.—Villa's loss in the battle with Americans is placed at sixty by Pershing in his report to General Funston today. Bodies were found in houses and scattered in underbrush along the route taken by the fleeing Mexicans.

Villa is believed to be northeast of Guerrero, but General Pershing said there is little chance of his escape, as he is practically surrounded by four cavalry regiments. General Pershing's reports were dated March 31, and April 1. He said a snow storm which is sweeping over San Geronimo ranch, which is at a high altitude, made operations of the Americans difficult.

CAVALRYMEN DISCOVER
TRACKS VILLA CARRIAGE

Army Headquarters in Mexico, via Columbus, April 1.—Cavalrymen hunting Villa today found tracks of a carriage wheel in the mountain waste of the Guerrero district. In following the trail it is believed that a trace of Villa can be picked up, as he is reported to have left the battlefield in a carriage. American troops encountered no natives who admit they have seen Villa.

TO PROTECT MILE
STONES OF D. OF C.

(By Associated Press.)
Washington, April 1.—Two of the original mile stones marking the boundary line of the District of Columbia and located by Major Andrew Elliott in 1791 and 1792 under the direction of President Washington, are to be placed and preserved by iron or steel fences three by three feet and five feet high to be erected by the Daughters of the American Revolution. Secretary Baker of the war department has given the society permission to erect the fences. The stones are located on the northwest boundary line running from the Potomac river to the northernmost point of the District of Columbia, near Silver Spring.

VILLA LEAVES BLOODY PATH BEHIND HIM

Authentic Story of Murder of
Three Americans, German
and Briton, Received.

(By Associated Press.)
El Paso, April 1.—The story of the murder of three Americans, a German and an Englishman at Minaca, was brought here today by Americans arriving from Chihuahua City. It is accepted as authentic by federal officials. Villa's victims were Benjamin Snell, Dr. A. T. Stell, Lee Lindley, Americans; Herman Blackeborn, German; Donald McGregor, Englishman. Two other Americans, Henry Acklin and Frank Woods, were in Minaca, but their fate was not determined. According to the story Villa captured Minaca, Guerrero and Sanleandro last Monday. He announced his intention of killing all "Gringos" he caught and he kept his word. No quarter was shown to Carranza troops who resisted. According to refugees General Herrera left Chihuahua City on Tuesday with a large number of troops. His destination was not made public.

SOUTH CAROLINA TO SAVE ABOUT \$25,000

The State Will Refund Bonds
With Check for \$4,
772,037.20.

Columbia, April 1.—S. T. Carter, state treasurer, today received a check for \$4,772,037.20 from J. P. Matthews, cashier of the Palmetto national bank in payment for the new issue of state bonds. At the same time, the new bonds were delivered to brokers in Charleston, Baltimore and New York. The state will save about \$25,000 a year by refunding the bonds.

BY THE CENSOR

(By Associated Press.)
London, April 1.—German infantry attacks, attempting to follow up German successes in gaining a foothold at the village of Vaux, have been stopped by a French curtain of fire according to reports from Paris.

The French positions between Amancourt and Valenciennes are being subjected to a heavy bombardment. Berlin claims the British grenade attack near Stelo was repulsed.

Berlin summarizes the recent Russian offensive as without results, and fixes the Russian casualties at least one hundred and forty thousand.

Twenty-eight were killed and forty-four wounded in Peppolia raids over the eastern counties of England yesterday night. Peppolia is a village in a British anti-air craft gun and dropped in the Thames Estuary and captured by a British patrol boat.

Seventeen unaccounted and several Germans were taken prisoners after they left the air ship. The ship was towed to a safe place.

German ministers of state held an extraordinary council.

Italian appears stirred with indignation over crisis. Recent entente conference in Paris said it was caused with uneasiness rather than recent sinking of the British ship Thetania.

FIGHT AGAINST SHAD HATCHERY REGRETTED

Interesting Correspondence Relative to Stopping Edisto River With Fish Given Out.

The following correspondence between Senator R. Tillman, of South Carolina, and the Hon. H. M. Smith, commissioner of the bureau of fisheries of the department of commerce, relative to shad hatching on the Edisto river, has been given out for publication by Senator Tillman.

My Dear Senator:
I write to you that pursuant to our plan and in accordance with the promise made to you some time ago, we have begun shad hatching on the Edisto river in connection with the operations of the Orangeburg station. The season appears to have been late and the results up to the end of the week were not large, but I am hopeful that some worthwhile work will have been done during the remainder of the season at the Orangeburg hatcheries now in operation at Jacksonville and Branchville.

I enclose for your information and for such action as you may think it advisable to take an extract from a letter from our superintendent at Orangeburg station showing that some of the local fish dealers have been endeavoring to defeat the plans for shad hatching on the Edisto. It is not clear from the information now at hand just what is the basis for their action. As much as our superintendent is a man of tact and capacity, I am hopeful that he will be able to overcome the local opposition.

SMITH OF S. C. OFFERS
AMENDMENT TO GOVERNMENT BILL

ARMY MEASURE UP

No Evidence of Work on Mass of
Amendments Submitted to
Bill.

(By Associated Press.)
Washington, April 1.—General debate on the army reorganization bill continued in the senate today, with no evidence of early work on the mass of amendments submitted to the measure.

Chairman Chamberlain made no effort to limit the debate. Senator Borah attacked the provision federalizing the national guard as unconstitutional. Senators Cummins and Lewis disagreed with him, defending militia provisions but attacking the section providing a federal volunteer force. Senator Brandegee submitted an amendment to increase the regular army to two hundred and fifty thousand instead of one hundred and eighty thousand as proposed by the bill.

Senator Smith, of South Carolina, offered an amendment appropriating fifteen million dollars for a government nitrate plant.

GERMANY SAYS NO REPORT OF SUB DISASTERS

BERLIN TELLS GERARD NO
OFFICIAL INFORMATION
EXPLOSION RECEIVED

TO MAKE A REPORT OF INVESTIGATION

May Be Weeks Before All Sub-
marine Commanders Have
Time to Report.

(By Associated Press.)
Washington, April 1.—Germany has informed Ambassador Gerard that it is without official information concerning the explosions which damaged the British channel steamer Sussex and sunk the British Englishman. The Berlin government promised to inform Gerard when its investigation is completed. It is realized here that it may be weeks before all German submarine commanders which might have been concerned, have time to report. Lansing said today he had received no dispatches of importance in the state department's investigation of disasters.

GERMAN WHO HELD UP SHIP IS IDENTIFIED

Schiller Best Known As Hudson
and Had Planned Other
Outrages.

New York, April 1.—Ernest Schiller, who single-handedly captured the British steamer Matoppe at sea Wednesday night, was identified today as Clarence Hudson. According to the police division, with three other men, planned to dynamite the Curran liner Panama in New York March 30th. Hudson was looked up here tonight on the dynamite charge. Hudson, who admitted he used a motor boat in which dynamite was found, said this plan to blow up the Panama was abandoned when his confederates quit.

ENGINEER IS BLAMED FOR R. R. DISASTER

Claim That Herman Hess Dis-
regarded Caution and Stop
Signals.

(By Associated Press.)
Cleveland, O., April 1.—D. C. Moon, general manager of the New York Central railway, tonight blamed Herman Hess, engineer of the second section of the Chicago-Pittsburgh limited for the wreck at Amherst, Ohio, Wednesday, in which twenty-eight were killed and forty injured. Moon said Hess disregarded the caution and stop signals.

SMITH ESTATE IS WORTH OVER TWO MILLION

Savannah, Ga., April 1.—The estate of James M. Smith, the Oglethorpe county millionaire, who died several months ago, was worth \$2,105,359.39, according to a report filed by the appraisers appointed by the federal district court here.

The estate appraisers placed the valuation at \$1,417,715.00. The federal appraisers, George B. Haines and H. B. Wilson, found real estate in the Georgia counties, valued at \$178,500; money in banks, \$100,000; stocks and bonds, \$400,000; other property, \$112,139.39.
