

INCINERATOR PLANT READY FOR BUSINESS

FIRE PUT IN IT FOR FIRST TIME YESTERDAY AFTERNOON

GET RID OF WASTE

Has Capacity of 10 Tons Daily and is An Up to Date Plant in Every Respect.

The incinerator plant was fired up for the first time yesterday afternoon, it having been practically completed. The fire was put in it for the purpose of drying it out, and getting it ready for business Monday. The plant is located on East Market street about one-half mile from the city hall. Members of city council and a few visitors visited the plant yesterday afternoon.

The incinerator plant has been erected by the Nye Odorless Creamatory company of Macon, Ga., and has meant an expenditure of \$5,250. It is a one-unit plant with a capacity of from 10 to 15 tons per day of city run garbage, trash, waste paper, dead animals, etc.

The Nye Odorless Creamatory is a new invention, which is a novel combination and arrangement of a baker's oven, a dry-kill, a combustion chamber, and a furnace, with a preheated air arrangement. The structure is built with brick, iron and steel, and is approximately 16x20 feet. The front and back walls are 22 inches thick, with an air chamber in each, and lined with fire brick. Between the front and back walls is built the arch, which is 22 inches thick, and lined with the best fire brick specially made, both as to shape and quality. There is a steel stack 40 feet high, lined with special brick, and having an air space between the brick and steel stack to protect the latter from getting hot. The tipping floor on top of the furnace is steel, supported on steel beams. The garbage carts and wagons dump their loads on this steel platform, and the garbage, trash, waste boxes, paper, etc., are fed or dumped through the door in this platform directly into the fire chamber, and can be burned very rapidly.

This plant cremates to an ash all city-run garbage, dead animals, trash, waste paper, and all waste of every conceivable description. Bottles, cans, wire and other like substances are no impediment with the system. Those substances of a non-combustible nature pass out with the ashes perfectly cleaned and disinfected by the intense heat of the dry kiln combustion chamber.

GEORGIA'S INDUSTRIES READY TO AID SHOULD COUNTRY GO TO WAR

Atlanta, April 14.—Georgia's industries are going to be mobilized for war. If bad comes to worst in Uncle Sam's international relations and President Wilson can no longer maintain peace with honor, the call to arms will not find the industries of Georgia in a disorganized, chaotic condition of unpreparedness. The government committee of experts that is correlating and classifying the resources and industries of the United States has appointed a sub-committee of prominent manufacturers and business men in this state, who will mobilize Georgia from the economic standpoint.

The Georgia committee consists of Oscar Elias, of Atlanta; G. R. Solomon, of Atlanta; A. E. Schoep, of Atlanta; Dr. S. W. McCallie, state geologist of Georgia; F. N. Smalley, of Savannah.

The committee has perfected organization and already is working on definite lines.

MORE ENFORCEMENT FOR AUTO DRIVERS

CHIEF OF POLICE INSTRUCT-ED TO HAVE MEN KEEP WATCHOUT

COMPLAINTS MADE

Many Drivers of City Have Become Reckless and Something Had to Be Done.

At the special meeting of city council held yesterday afternoon the question of non-observance of the ordinance as to the driving and use of automobiles on the streets of Anderson was discussed, and as a result, the chief of police was instructed to have his men keep a close watch and see that the regulations were not violated. Several complaints have been made to the mayor and members of council, and it was necessary to take some action.

The police were instructed to have cases made against those violating the speed limit, those using "cutouts", those driving dangerously or recklessly, those not having the head lights of the machines burning, passing street-cars which were standing still, etc., the police at all times use their judgment in dealing with the violators and to have cases made in their discretion.

Many of the drivers of automobiles in the city have become a little careless of late, and there has been considerable complaint. It was stated yesterday afternoon that this would not be a spasmodic enforcement of the law, but that the police would be instructed to enforce the ordinance at all times.

BOOZE SHORTAGE NOT TO KEEP CONVENTIONS FROM EMPIRE CAPITAL

Atlanta, April 14.—The fact that Atlanta is going to be a dry town after May 1st, when the new Georgia prohibition laws go in effect, is not preventing the local convention bureau from securing its usual large number of conventions for this city. Reports received by the bureau from other parts of the state and the various cities show that conventions will come to Georgia despite the usual supply of intoxicants.

"There may be some people and some conventions that select a city according to its booze supply" said a member of the convention bureau today, "but they don't happen to be the people or the conventions that the local convention bureau is desirous of securing for Atlanta."

"Or, stating the proposition a bit differently, the conventions which the bureau is desirous of securing for this city are made up of men who have more important considerations in mind when they select a meeting place than the question of whether the city inviting them can provide an adequate supply of liquor."

The ushering in of Georgia's dry era on May 1st, was contemplated with some apprehension by several members of the convention bureau who are not especially in favor of liquor, but are anxious for Atlanta to rank near the top as a convention city and who were afraid the absence of liquor might deter conventions from coming here.

A prominent cotton mill president attending the recent convention of the American Cotton Manufacturers' association in Atlanta, was asked if he thought the new prohibition laws would cut any figure in Atlanta's future career as a convention city.

"In my opinion it will not," he said. "Conventions that are worth getting are made up of business men who go to conventions to transact business—not to engage in a protracted spree, and I should think the fact that a city is dry would cut no figure whatsoever in the selection of a meeting place. The thing that conventions want to know is NOT whether you have an adequate supply of booze, but whether you have an adequacy for accommodating delegates and whether you have facilities for housing their sessions."

AN ORDINANCE

Relating to Dogs on the Public Streets of Anderson.

Be it ordained by the city council of Anderson, South Carolina.

Section 1.—That after the publication of this ordinance in any newspaper or newspapers of the city, it shall be unlawful for any dog to be on the public streets or other public places of the city, whether muzzled or unmuzzled, and any dog thereafter found on any such street or place shall be seized by any policeman and impounded for a period of thirty-six (36) hours; and unless the owner of any such dog appears to claim same within such time, such dog shall be killed. If such owner appears, within such period of 36 hours, such dog shall be returned to the owner upon his or her promise and agreement not to permit said dog to again be on said public street or place and thereafter if such dog be found on any such street or place, such dog shall be killed.

Sec. 2.—That it shall be the duty of every owner of a dog or person having control thereof to keep such dog off the streets and other public places of the city at all times and to comply with the terms of this ordinance and the failure or refusal of any such owner or person having control of any such dog to comply with any of the requirements of this ordinance shall be deemed a misdemeanor and a correction thereof shall be punished by a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars (\$100.00) or imprisonment not exceeding thirty (30) days.

Sec. 3.—That in the judgment of the city council the public welfare and safety demands the passage of this ordinance, and the enforcement of its provisions.

Done and ratified under the corporate seal of said city this 14th day of April, 1916.
