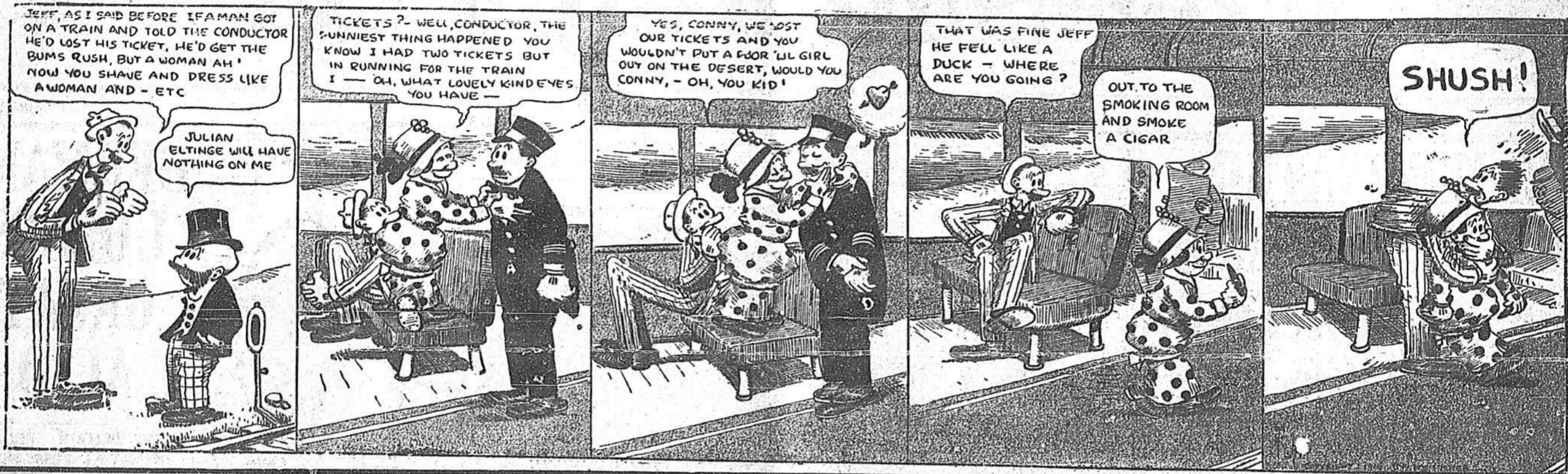

## AUTHENTIC REPORT OF SEIGE AT KUT COMING GRADUALLY TO LIGHT

(By Associated Press.)  
 London, June 3.—The straits to which General Townshend's little army at Kut, the remnant of the force which passed almost to Bagdad, was reduced before it surrendered with the approval of the home government are becoming only gradually known in England. The latest contribution to the annals of its siege comes in a letter from Edmund Candler, correspondent with the expedition which attempted in the face of impossible weather conditions to relieve Townshend's beleaguered troops.  
 "For four months Townshend's men were under a most constant fire with no possibility of making any safe protection from the shells. During the last weeks of the siege the daily deaths from fire and disease caused mainly by hunger averaged eight British and twenty-one Indians. When Kut finally capitulated the regiment holding the front line, which had been there a fortnight without relief, was too weak to carry their regiment.  
 The real privations began in the middle of February, especially in the hospital. When milk gave out the hospital diet was corn flour or rice water for the sick and the ordinary soldiers' rations for the wounded. Until April 21 there was a daily grain ration of four ounces. From the 22 to the 25th the garrison subsisted on two days reserve ration issued in January and from the 25th to the 29th on food dropped by aeroplanes.  
 The details Candler sends were obtained from wounded British soldiers who were permitted by the Turks to join the main British force below Kut. The writer adds:  
 "All the artillery, cavalry, and transport animals had been consumed before the garrison fell.  
 One of the last mules to be slaughtered had been on three Indian frontier campaigns and wore the ribbons round its neck. The supply and transport butcher had sent it back twice, refusing to kill it, but in the end it had to go with the machine gun mules. Mule flesh was generally preferred to horse and mule fat supplied good dripping; also an improvised substitute for lamp oil.  
 "The tobacco famine was a great privation, but the garrison did not find the enforced abstinence cured their craving as every kind of substitute was there. An Arab brand, a species similar to that smoked in Indian hookahs, was exhausted early in April. After that lime leaves were smoked or ginger or baked tea dregs. In January English "baccy" fetched over three pounds a half pound. In an auction of a dead officers effects a box of cheap Indian cheroots fetched over thirteen pounds, a box of Egyptian cigarettes eight pounds, and a tin of condensed milk two pound 5s.

## PEACE TERMS REACHED WITH CHINESE REBEL

Peking, June 3.—A dispatch sent from Chongta, the capital of Szechuen province, by the correspondent of a news agency, states that Tsai Ao, the revolutionary leader, and Chen Yi, the military governor of Sze-chuen, who is carrying on negotiations on behalf of the Peking government, have agreed to the following conditions of peace:  
 "1. To permit Yuan Shi-kai to remain in office. 2. The reestablishment of parliament within two months. 3. To revert to the regulations governing the administration during the first year of the republic. 4. To allow the present independent officials to remain in office. 5. To pardon all political offenders. 6. To station a number of southern troops in Peking. 7. To recall a number of northern troops to Peking. 8. To send General Tuan Chi-jui to Wuchang as military governor. 9. To keep General Feng Kuo-chang at Nanking."  
 The revolutionary press asserts that Tsai Ao has never agreed to any peace conditions which included the retention of Yuan Shi-kai as president.  
 The message has been credited by the Peking government, which has had previous indications of satisfactory progress in the negotiations between Chen Yi and Tsai Ao.

## WAR MAY CLOSE DREYFUSS CASE

Both Sides Have Won Honors On French Front

(By Associated Press.)  
 Paris, June 3.—The war is expected to terminate all controversy over the Dreyfuss affair, which was still the subject of division among the Frenchmen at the beginning of hostilities. The Royalist paper, Action Francaise has dropped its daily reminder of what it declared to be irregularities committed by the Court of Appeals in favor of Dreyfuss and papers of all shades of opinion do honor to this involved on both sides of the question who have distinguished themselves in the war.  
 Besides Pierre Dreyfuss, who was recently cited for heroic conduct at Beaumont, Emile Dreyfuss, his nephew, was killed in the battle of Champagne just after he had received the cross of the Legion of Honor. Commending the ardency of a sector of the entrenched camp of Paris.  
 Of the men identified with the movement against Dreyfuss, Colonel du Puy de Clam and his sons have all won war crosses and all of them have been promoted in the Legion of Honor. Commandant Lantz has been Commandant Paul's Saint-Sire and Artois have won the stars of general.

## BOYS FARM CLUBS FORMED IN ITALY

Plans Made To Care For Orphans Of Soldiers

(By Associated Press.)  
 Rome, June 3.—Boys' farm colonies as one means of providing for the future cultivation of Italy's soil and for the employment of orphans of farmer-soldiers killed in war, are being established throughout the country districts of Italy. The colonies are being organized by a society founded especially for this purpose under a plan drawn up by the National Institution of Agricultural Mutual Insurance. No fewer than twelve such colonies are now being founded.  
 Boys from the ages of 7 to 16 years are being taken in to these schools, where they will be kept at an annual expenditure of \$100 each. The plan is to keep the boys on the farms until 21 years of age. They will be taught cattle raising, breeding of silk worms, rotation of crops, treatment of the soil, and use of modern agricultural machinery of the American type.
