South Leads in LIFE INSURANCE

Making Greater Strides Forward than Any Other Section.

Atlanta, Ga., June 27,-The safety and permanency of business or ganization of the south, as compared to other sections, is no more strikingly illustrated than in the case of insurance companies. In statement carried in the current issues of the Manufacturers Record of Baltimore, it is shown that South has done far better than the est of the country.

During the last hundred years or so, there have been 216 life companles retired, either by reinsurance, liside the south, while in the southern states there have been only 72.

A showing of actual operations is also to the credit of the south. At the beginning of 1914, fifty nine sou-thern companies which had been in business an average of nine years each, had insurance in force of \$697. 151,607, with combined assets \$72,402,962. Of the companies other sections only 93 had been in business nine years and these had in force \$278.362,539 at the end of their ninth year, with combined assets of \$38,667,420.

The percentage of companies in the south which were able to recusare their business in other organizations was 52 1-2; in the other sections 55.

The percentage of outright failures in the south was the same as the rest of the country, 25.

The data printed in the Manufacturers Record was compiled by Rob-ert F. Moore, agency secretary of the Southern States Life Insurance comany of Atlanta.

Commenting on the situation, Mr. Moore cays: "Failure of any business organization, whether life insurance or other industry, is not governed by geographical location; it can almost invariably be traced to some fundamental cause when the comments of the cays some fundamental cause, such as poor judgment ansound principles, undue expenses, extravagance improper administration."

TEXAS RANGERS AT WAR STRENGTH

Four Companies Composed of Men Who Do Things.

MANY FROM THE RANCHES.

Are Used to Rough Life and Are Familiar With Every Foot of Border Territory-Drinking, Gambling and Profanity Are Barred-All Are Crack Shots and Hardened Truopers.

For the first time in more than forty years the Texas ranger force has been recruited to its full strength of eightytwo men and officers. When Governor Ferguson issued an order recently that the organization be raised to "war" strength the office of Adjutant General Hutchings was immediately flooded with applications for enlistment. Many muscular, keen eyed men, each bearing the distinguishing marks of the ranch and open spaces in his attire and general aspect, went to Austin in person and made every possible effort to get into the service. General Hutchings says he could have easily formed regiment within a few days.

Practically all of the ranger recruits came from the ranches. In most instances they are perfectly familiar with the border region. Besides being proficient in the Spanish language, they know the Mexican character intimate-ly. The rangers do not follow may deined military tactics or rules of cam-paign. They simply go out and "get" their men. The fact that the victim is usually dead when he is brought back makes the very name "ranger" a ter-ror to evildoers on the border.

Strenuous Requirements.

It has always been a requirement of the ranger force that he shall be an expert shot with pistol and rifle, a good rider, of perfect physical fitness and proved daring and bravery. To these essentials there has been added in comparatively recent years the requirements that the ranger must not be addicted to gambling. And it is easy to find plenty of men who measure up. Because a ranger shoots to reason why he may not be a good church membe

Captain John R. Hughes, who served for more than a quarter of a century in the ranger service and retired a year or so ago, was of the mild mannered, churchgoing-type, who was at the same time a terror to the lawless element. For several years be was superintendent of the Sunday school at Ysleta. He has been known to dismiss his Sunday school and mount his horse and go in a chase aft 'r bandits, perhaps killing an outlaw or two on the expedition. Drinking, gambling and profanity were absolutely barred among the men comprising his com-

The ranger force as now organized consists of four separate companies of mounted men, each company consisting of a captain, one first sorgeant and twenty privates.

Their Equipment The pay of the captains is \$100 each month; sergeants, \$50; privates, \$40. The term of enlistment is two years. subject to disbondment of all or any part of the force at any time. Each of ficer, noncommissioned officer and private is required to furnish himself with a suitable horse, saddle, bridle and clothing. The state must pay for the horse if it is killed in action. The carbine and pistol are furnished by the state, but the cost is deducted from the wages of the ranger on the first pay day. The state furnishes rations, camp equipage, ammunition and forage,

WEST POINTERS MAY GO.

Class of 1917 May Be Graduated Once to Supply Officers. Embarrassed by a shortage of regu


lary army officers at this time, members of the general staff considered graduation next month of the class at West Point who ordinarily would grad-uate in June. 1917. In the event of war, some officials told Secretary Baker,

some officials told Secretary Baker, such a step would be necessary.

Procedent for such action occurred during the Spanish-American war, when first class men at the Military academy were graduated in February instead of June, 1808, and the class that would have graduated in 1890 was graduated in June, 1808.

The suggestion now considered is to give these men their commissions in July and send them out as militia and recruit instructors. Should the number be insufficient it was suggested these led cadets be commissioned and assigned to posts, while the class that would graduate ordinarily in 1918 be sent out as militia instructors.
