### A Letter from Winthrop.

The State summer school for teachers is gradually working to a close. There are 459 teachers enrolled, gathered from the seaboard to the mountains of South Carolina. It is generally conceded by those who have attended former summer schools that the teacher-pupils have come with a more serious aim than has distinguished preceding summer schools; and though there are not as many as usual, the quality of work being done is of the highest type. Much of this is due to the learned faculty, which is one of the strongest that has ever been secured for summer school work.

The "campus course" seems to be declining in popularity; an evidence of this may be seen by the number of lights shining from the dormitory windows at night, an indication that the occupants are pouring over history, for they know not what Prof. Davis may ask them, or Prof. Wardlaw's pedagogical psychology, or some one or more of the twenty courses offered, from kindergarten principals to Greek and Latin. One of the most popular courses is Miss Bonham's Observation and Practice work; the classes are crowded. Every day application is made to the superintendent for permission to visit this department.

The faculty have at last decided that "all work and no play make Jack a dull boy," so on the evening of the 9th, twenty of the young men had a "potato race" in the large auditorium of the main building conducted by Profs. D. B. Johnson and Wm. Hammel. It was quite amusing to see the young men each trying to pick up the greatest number of potatoes with a teaspoon in the three minutes allotted them. Mr. Thomas secured the greatest number in less time and therefore received the first prize, a handsome fountain pen. Prof. White Reid won the booby prize—a large tin spoon.

On Friday night there was an entertainment, called a "Book Review" by forty young ladies, gotten up by Miss Macfeat for the free Kindergarten of Rock Hill.

The State Teachers Association will hold its annual meeting at Winthrop the 15th and 16th of July. In consequence the teacher-pupils will be given the 16th. They are looking forward to it as eagerly as a child would for a holiday.
