Choked to Death.

When the death of Mr. E. A. Nelson was announced in our last issue, the cause of his death was not then known. A dispatch published in The State the next morning contained the information that he was choked to death while eating a piece of rare beef-steak. Those sitting about him noticed that he was choking and a physician was summoned, but he arrived too late. Mr. Nelson's remains were brought to Winnsboro Wednesday night and interred in the Presbyterian cemetery Thursday morning. The funeral exercises were conducted by Rev. C. E. McDonald, assisted by Rev. J. L. Freeman.

If you wish to apply nitrogen or ammonia to wheat, wait till next March and put nitrate of soda on it. By that time you will know whether you have any wheat or not. Fifty pounds of nitrate of soda will give you about 24 pounds of ammonia. That is more than you would get out of three sacks of commercial guano. The nitrate should be thoroughly mixed with three times its weight of finely pulverized rich dirt before sowing.—Carolina Spartan.

NOTICE OF ELECTION, FOR REPRESENTATIVE IN CONGRESS FIFTH DISTRICT.

STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA, }
COUNTY OF FAIRFIELD. }

Notice is hereby given that the General Election for Representative in Congress will be held at the voting precincts fixed by law in the County of Fairfield on Tuesday, November 4, 1902, said day being Tuesday following the first Monday, as prescribed by law.

The qualifications for suffrage are as follows:

Residence in the State for two years, in the County one year, in the polling precinct in which the elector offers to vote four months, and the payment six months before any election of any poll tax then due and payable: Provided, That ministers in charge of an organized church and teachers of public schools shall be entitled to vote after six months' residence in the State, otherwise qualified.

Registration.

Payment of all taxes, including poll tax, assessed and collectible during the previous year. The production of a certificate or of the receipt of the officer authorized to collect such taxes shall be conclusive proof of the payment thereof.

Before the hour fixed for opening the polls Managers and Clerks must take and subscribe the Constitutional oath. The Chairman of the Board of Managers can administer the oath to the other Managers and to the Clerk; a Notary Public must administer the oath to the Chairman. The Managers elect their Chairman and Clerk.

Polls at each voting place must be opened at 7 o'clock a. m. and closed at 4 o'clock p. m., except in the city of Charleston, where they shall be opened at 7 a. m. and closed at 6 p. m.

The Managers have the power to fill a vacancy, and if none of the Managers attend the citizens can appoint from among the qualified voters the Managers, who after being sworn, can conduct the election.

At the close of the election, the Managers and Clerk must proceed publicly to open the ballot boxes and count the ballots therein, and continue without adjournment until the same is completed, and make a statement of the result for each office and sign the same.

Within three days thereafter, the Chairman of the Board, or some one designated by the Board, must deliver to the Commissioners of Election the poll list, the boxes containing the ballots and written statements of the result of the election.

FOR STATE AND COUNTY OFFICERS, AND UPON PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION

STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA }
COUNTY OF FAIRFIELD }

Notice is hereby given that the general election for State and County officers will be held at the voting precincts prescribed by law in said County, on Tuesday, November 4, 1902, said day being Tuesday following the first Monday in November, as prescribed by law.

At the said election a separate box will be provided, at which qualified electors will vote upon the adoption or rejection of an amendment to the State Constitution as provided in the following Joint Resolution.

A Joint Resolution Proposing to Amend Section II. of Article VII of the Constitution of 1895, Relating to Counties and County government.

SECTION I. Be it resolved by the General Assembly of the State of South Carolina: That the following amendment to SECTION II., Article VII., of the Constitution, be agreed to: add to the end thereof the following words: that this section shall not apply to the following townships in the following Counties: Dunklin and Oaklawn in the County of Green-

rillo; the townships of Cokesbury, Ninety-Six and Cooper in the County of Greenwood; Sullivan Township in the County of Laurens; Huiett and Pine Grove in the County of Saluda. That the corporate existence of said townships be, and the same is hereby, destroyed and all corporate agents removed.

SECTION 2. But the question of adopting this amendment shall be submitted at the next general election to the electors as follows: Those in favor of the amendment shall deposit a ballot with the following words plainly printed or written thereon: "Constitutional amendment of Section Eleven of Article Seven of the Constitution, relating to Counties and County Government, No."

Those opposed to said amendment shall cast a ballot with the following words plainly printed or written thereon: "Constitutional amendment of Section Eleven of Article Seven of the Constitution, relating to Counties and County Government, No." Approved the 28th day of February, A. D. 1902.

Sec. 7. There shall be separate and distinct ballots and boxes at this election for the following officers, to wit: 1. Governor and Lieutenant Governor. 2. Other State officers. 3. State Senator. 4. Members of the House of Representatives. 5. County officers. On which shall be the name or names of the person or persons voted for as such officers, respectively, and the office for which they are voted.
