#### NOTICE OF ELECTION.

##### Upon the Proposition of the Removal of the Dispensaries from Fairfield County.

Notice is hereby given that an election will be held at the several precincts established by law in Fairfield County, on Tuesday, December 12, 1905, upon the question of the removal of the Dispensaries from said county, pursuant to an Act of the General Assembly, approved the 20th day of February, 1904, which said Act is as follows:

An Act to amend Section 7 of an Act entitled "An Act to provide for the election of the State Board of Control, and to further regulate the sale, use, consumption, transportation and disposition of intoxicating and alcoholic liquors or liquids in this State, and prescribe further penalties for violation of the Dispensary Laws, and to police the same," approved March 6, 1896.

Section 7. There may be one or more County Dispensaries appointed for each county, the place of business of each of whom shall be designated by the County Board of Control, but the State Board of Control must give consent before more than one Dispensary can be appointed in the county, and when the County Board designates a locality for a Dispensary, twenty days' public notice of which shall be given, it shall be competent for a majority of the qualified voters of the township in which such Dispensary is to be located to prevent its location in such township, by signing a petition or petitions, addressed to the County Board, requesting that no Dispensary be established in that township.

A Dispensary may be located elsewhere than in an incorporated town in the Counties of Beaufort and Horry, and no others except such as are authorized by special Act of the General Assembly. (Any county may secure the establishment of a Dispensary or Dispensaries, or the removal of a Dispensary or Dispensaries within its limits, in the following manner: upon the petition of one-fourth of the qualified voters of each county for an election upon either the question of the establishment or the removal of Dispensaries therein being filed with the County Supervisor of each county, he shall order an election, submitting the question of "Dispensary" or "No Dispensary" to the qualified voters of such county, which shall be conducted as other special elections, and if a majority of the ballots cast be found and declared to be for a Dispensary, then a Dispensary may be established in said county, but if a majority of the ballots cast be found and declared to be against the Dispensary, then no Dispensary shall be established therein, and any Dispensary already established shall be closed.) Elections under this Section can be held not oftener than once in four years.

No Dispensary shall be established in any county, town or city where, in the sale of alcoholic liquor was prohibited prior to July 1, 1893, except as herein permitted: *Provided*, That where Dispensaries have been established in said county, town or city, they shall remain as established until removed or closed as permitted in this Act; *Provided*, A tax of one-half mill annually is hereby levied upon every dollar of the value of all taxable property in all counties voting to remove or close the Dispensaries, as above provided, for the purpose of defraying the expenses of the enforcement of the Dispensary Law in said county, under and by direction of the Governor, said tax to be collected as other county taxes and forwarded to the State Treasurer to be expended or so much thereof as may be necessary, as now provided by law, for such purposes. Any balance remaining unexpended at the end of the year to be returned by the State Treasurer to the County Treasurer of such county for general county purposes, and that the value of all confiscation of contraband goods seized in such county, as determined by the State Board of Directors, shall be paid to the State Treasurer to be credited to the fund raised by said levy for the enforcement of the law, as above provided. And any amount expended in said county for the enforcement of Dispensary Law, shall be refunded to the State Treasury upon the collection of the tax above levied. Any county voting out a Dispensary, shall not thereafter receive any part of the sur-

plus that may remain of the Dispensary school funds, after the deficiencies in the various county schools funds have been made up as provided by law.

Sec. 2. That all Acts or parts of Acts inconsistent with this Act be, and the same are hereby, repealed.

On the day of election the Managers must organize by the election of a Chairman and a Clerk, if necessary. The Chairman elected is empowered to administer oaths.

The Managers have the power to fill any vacancy, and if none of the Managers attend, the citizens can appoint from among the qualified voters the Managers, who, after being sworn, can conduct the election.

At the close of the election the Managers and Clerk must proceed publicly to open the ballot boxes and count the ballots therein, and continue without adjournment until the same is completed, and make a statement of the result.

Within three days thereafter, the Chairman of the Board, or some one designated by the Board, must deliver to the Commissioners of Election the poll list, the boxes containing the ballots, and written statements of the result of the election.

The Managers at each precinct named above are requested to delegate one of their number to secure boxes and blanks for the election. They can be secured from among the qualified voters of the County House.

Managers will be paid \$1.00 per day for coming for the boxes and five cents per mile each way by the most direct route; one dollar per day for returning the boxes and same mileage as above; one dollar per day on day of election and five cents per mile each way, going and returning home, not to exceed three days in all. Each set of Managers is allowed a Clerk, who receives the same pay as the Managers.
