Good Dividends.

The Winnsboro Bank is making its stock holders glad by paying out its usual semi-annual dividend of five per cent. This is a fine showing. This bank now has a loan account of more than a half million, which is very much larger than it has ever carried at any other time.

As the Bank of Fairfield has not been in operation but a short while, no dividend will be declared at this time, though from its report recently published it can be seen that it is doing a good business. The combined business of the two banks as compared with the business of the one bank indicates a considerable increase in the amount of business that is being done in Winnsboro.

The Bank of Ridgeway has also paid out to its stock holders its usual dividend of 4 per cent.

All the games were well played. For the home boys DesPortes' pitching and Ellison's all round playing were special features. Ferguson's catch for the visitors in the third game was quite sensational at a critical time.

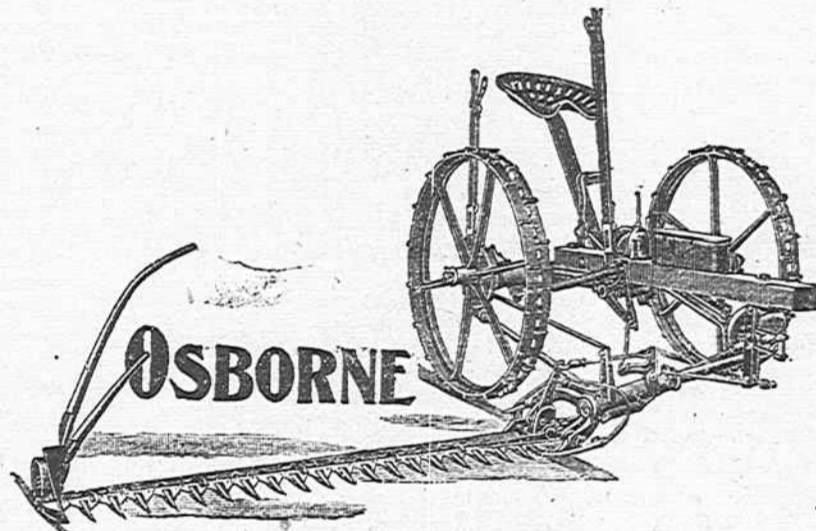

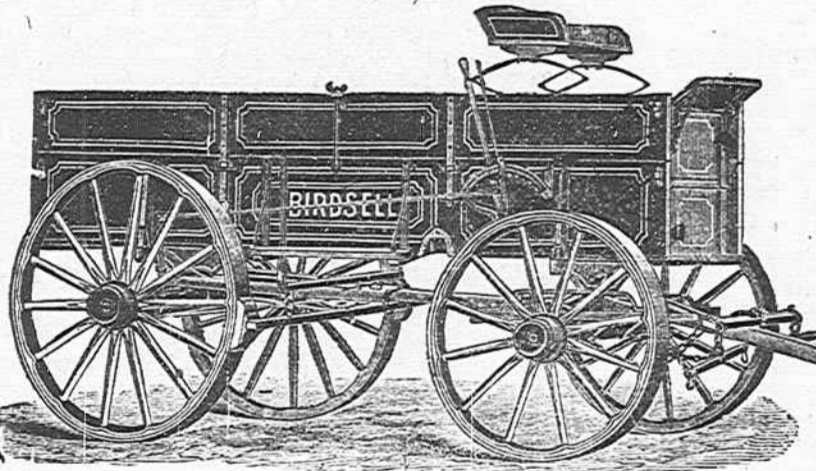
