Christ: An Endeavor Notes. NOVEMBER FOURTH. The Blessedness of Communion with Christ.—John 14:15-26.

If we are in lack of comfort, we do not know the Comforter. The test of religion is joy. It is folly to dream of knowing Christ if we are ready to be known of Him. He will give Himself to us when we give ourselves to Him. Christ does not say, "Obey me, love me," but, "If you love me, you will obey me."

Communication with Christ means union with his work, his people, and his person. There can be no acquaintance with Christ, any more than with a human friend, without the spending of time with Christ. The more regular we are in our communion with Christ, the more we shall commune with Him also at irregular times.

The noble phrase, "Practise the presence of God," implies the truth that perfect communion comes only after much communion. God is here, and it is our fault if we do not perceive Him, just as the X-ray rays have always been an existence, though men did not see them. The problem of wireless telegraphy was solved when that marvellously delicate receiver was invented; but God's heart is instantly responsive to the least impulse from earth. Men spoil a conversation when they insist on monologues. There is no communion with God unless we will listen as well as speak.

Do I spend enough time in prayer? Do I allow worldly thoughts to vibrate my prayers? Is Christ's presence real to me when I pray?

Naps and Health. Prolonged "forty winks" during the day are severely condemned by many doctors on the ground that they affect one's regular sleep. Scientists have found that in the ordinary course in the human being there is the greatest vitality between 10 a. m. and 2 p. m., and the least between 2 o'clock and 6 in the morning. Long sleeps during the day interfere with this order of nature and sometimes affect various organs, causing headache. The nap of forty winks, but only forty, proves refreshing to many because it is so short to have an injurious consequence.—London Telegraph.

One hundred and six years, the stretch of time lying between 1800 and 1906, is a comparatively short period measured by the ages of the old world nations, but it includes within its limits almost the birth and practically all the development which the United States have undergone. The Department of Commerce and Labor throws light upon the course and the extent of this growth in a pamphlet recently issued. In 1806 the area of the United States was \$27,844 square miles, the population was 3,308,483, the public debt \$82,976,294, the money in circulation, \$16,000,000. In 1906 the area of the United States, exclusive of Alaska, is 3,025,399 square miles; the population, 84,545,000; the public debt, \$96,435,686; the money in circulation, \$673,327,009 of gold and \$188,474,995 of silver. The total money in circulation in 1806 was \$26,509,000, or \$5 per citizen, while in 1906 the money in circulation is \$2,744,483,830, or \$32.42 per citizen. In 1861 the number of pensioners was 8,636, receiving \$1,034,600; in 1906 the number of pensioners is 985,974, receiving \$111,034,632.—Charlotte, N. C. Observer.
