FREE COINAGE OF SILVER.

THE BILL PASSES THE SENATE BY A DECISION VOTE.

A Free Coinage Bill, Pure and Simple, Submitted for the Enfranchisement and Passes—Inaugals has an Awakening and...

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14.—According to the arrangement made yesterday the Senate proceeded to the consideration of the financial bill immediately after the reading of the journal.

Ingalls took the floor and said that there were two portentous evils which menaced the safety, if they did not endanger the existence, of the republic.

Stewart moved to strike out section four of the finance committee's bill, being a proposition for the issue of \$200,000,000 of bonds to pay up the outstanding debt.

The fourth section was struck out—years 48, 49, 50. Negative votes were given by Aldrich, Cameron, Casey, Dixon, Dolph, Edmunds, Frye, Hale, Hawley, Higgins, Hiscock, Hoar, McMillen, McPherson, Morrill, Platt, Quay, Sawyer, Sherman, Spooner, Stockbridge, Warren, Washburn, Wilson, of Iowa, Wilson and Maryland.

Stewart moved to strike out the third section of the bill (the proposed amendment to the national bank currency) and to insert in lieu of it the following:

That the Secretary of the Treasury is hereby authorized to replace all the sums of the national bank currency by the issue in lieu thereof of like sums in United States notes of the description and character of the United States notes now outstanding.

The Senate passed the free coinage bill, pure and simple, as a substitute for the financial bill. The vote was—years 29, 30, 31.

INTENSIVE FARMING.

A Field which has Never Had a Parallel in Southern Agriculture.

In the Home and Farm of January 1st, Mr. George W. Traut, of Georgia, describes the methods by which he has produced some of the most wonderful crops ever made in the South.

Three years ago I bought a farm at \$7 an acre. At that time I heard a great deal of intensive farming and decided that I would try it on eighty acres and see what merit there was in it.

The first year I used about 120 pounds of fertilizer to the acre and made only fourteen bales of cotton. As you will imagine I was not very enthusiastic on my crops or intensive farming.

The second year I saved the land good weeds and turned the stubbles under. In 1885 I used 300 pounds of fertilizer to the acre and made fifty-two bales of cotton.

I used on this crop seven and one-half tons of acid and seven and one-half tons of standard guano and 2,000 bushels of cotton seed.

My method is to plow the soil to a depth of 12 inches, then to harrow and to plant the seed in drills 12 inches apart.

Now comes the result of my crop of 1890, the largest yield on record. 104 bales of cotton on eighty acres of land.

Seventy-five bales cotton clear of all expenses averaging 400 pounds each at 94 cents. ... \$3,945.00

Besides corn enough to do for the next fifteen months and a good crop of next year. I can not give the cost of this crop in detail, but fully one-half or more of the 104 bales will be clear profit.

Next year I will use about ten tons of fertilizers to three acres, and have made one thousand pounds of seed cotton to the acre.

Mr. Traut's intensive farming methods have produced a record crop of 104 bales of cotton on 80 acres.

REMARKABLE OPERATION.

By the Skilful Hand of Dr. Jacob Ross.

NEW YORK, Jan. 9.—The remarkable and interesting surgical operation is drawing new attention at Manhattan hospital.

The operation has been in progress since Dec. 30th, some pieces of the skin being cut from the father's body from time to time and placed on the boy's knee until the wound has been almost completely covered.

The little fellow has borne the suffering incidentally to a painful operation with remarkable fortitude, and his bravery has been only equalled by his mother's.

Little Jacob was taken to the hospital. He was very weak, and it was five days before the doctor was able to get him on his feet.
