IN THE SENATE.

WHAT THIS BODY HAS DONE DURING THE WEEK.

An Effort to Abolish the Office of Phosphate Inspector Falls. The appropriation Bill Under Fire.

The Senate was not in session Saturday or Monday. On Tuesday nothing of general interest was done except the passing of a bill to urish school books at cost, which was afterwards reconsidered.

WHAT WAS DONE BY THE BODY LAST WEEK.

The Confederate Monument in Columbia to be Enclosed—Death of a Member of the House.

On Monday the House transacted considerable business, passing a large number of bills and killing about a score or more.

Mr. McCullough's bill relative to the collection of taxes was ordered to his third reading. The bill provides: Section 1. That after the approval of this Act the towns and cities of this State are hereby authorized and empowered to collect the taxes of such towns and cities in such instalments as the municipal authorities thereof may by ordinance prescribe.

Section 2. That the State of South Carolina do enclose the Confederate monument on the State House grounds was passed without debate; \$135 was appropriated to the purpose.

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
