The news spread like wild fire that troops would pass through Wainwright on Thursday. As early as four o'clock in the morning the small boy was at the depot. During the morning between 6 o'clock and 10 o'clock six sections passed, and the depot was crowded with men, women and children and they cheered the soldiers as the trains went flying through the town. The soldiers composed the ninth infantry, which has been stationed at Sackett Harbor, N. Y., and the 21st infantry. One section remained at the freight depot, for some time, waiting for the regular morning passenger to pass. The soldiers had just come from a region covered with snow, and they were simply entranced with the beautiful trees and flowers. They were all in a good humor and jolly but seemed fully to appreciate the situation. THE "CABINET MEMBER'S WIFE." 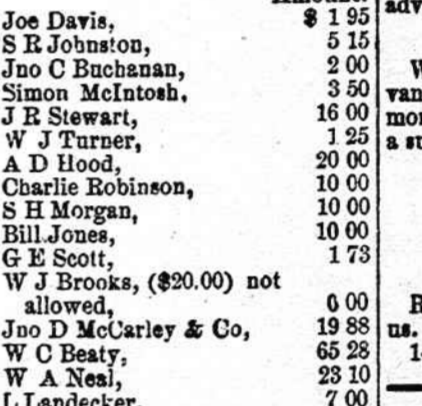
