PATRICK M. SPENCE.

On Tuesday, April 3rd, at Almwell cemetery the remains of Patrick M. Spence was laid to rest. Mr. Spence had not quite lived the three score and ten, allotted to man, being 63 years old at the time of his death.

In the death of this good and true man Ridgeway loses one of her best citizens and the county at large a noble man, whose place will not soon be filled. He was in every sense a just and true man, ever seeking to do his duty, to his neighbor, himself and to God. No cause could make him swerve from the straight path of his duty as a man and citizen. He was born in County Antrim, Ireland, in 1837—coming from that sturdy old Particular stock that has made itself famous for virtue wherever it found a home; and Patrick M.
