## A LECTURE TO CAMP RAISERS.

Col. Wade H. Manning, of Columbia, delivered a very interesting and instructive address before Camp Raisers in the court house on Monday. He chose "Memories" for his subject. The greater part of his address dealt with the unfairness of the Northern histories used in our public schools, and he urged that fair and impartial histories by Southern authors ought to be used. He emphasized that slavery was not the cause of the War for South and North, but it was a contest by the South for rights guaranteed by the constitution. He referred to how the cause of the war was misrepresented in most of the histories, many of which were used in our public schools. He referred to these famous letters of Gen. Sherman in which he said he stated that he (Sherman) trembled when he thought of the desolation that awaited South Carolina when his army should pass through the State, and in which Sherman asserted that the State would deserve all that was in store for her. Parts of the lecture were eloquent eulogies of the great Confederate leaders, and his address stirred his audience with enthusiasm.

**A CONVICT CAPTURED**

Wade Young, a notorious thief who escaped from a convict camp near Charlotte on the 14th of last February, was captured about a mile from Winnsboro on Tuesday by Mr. J. M. Elliott. Soon after the man made his escape from the convict camp Mr. Elliott, then deputy sheriff, received a letter from the sheriff of Mecklenburg county asking him to look out for him, but as the reward was only \$10, and would not be enough to compensate him for the trouble Mr. Elliott did not try to capture the man. On Tuesday morning Mr. Elliott was told that Young was near town and he then telegraphed to Sheriff Wallace, of Charlotte, to ask the amount that would be given for the arrest. Mr. Elliott upon hearing that the reward was \$20 started on his search. He found Young in a vacant house, about a mile from town, busy writing a letter upon a brand new Remington typewriter. Mr. Elliott surprised the fellow and covered him with a revolver before he could recover himself. The typewriter and makeshifts found in Young's possession were stolen from the Cotton Oil Company of Columbia, and upon being telegraphed to the company sent up a man to get the typewriter.

Mr. Elliott took his prisoner to Charlotte and delivered him up to Sheriff Wallace. The convict has, since his escape, been wandering over the country, and when caught was on his way home from New Orleans. Young did not resist arrest, and was apparently perfectly unconcerned at being caught, and on his way to Charlotte he gave Mr. Elliott an account of his travels after his escape from the camp.
