moved to York county in 1865 and was educated in the common schools of Rock Hill and Ebenezzer. In the fall of 1884 he entered South Carolina College and graduated in law with the class of 1886.

In 1890 Mr. Finley was elected a member of the House of Representatives and was chairman of the Ways and Means committee. In 1892 he went to the Senate and served as chairman of the Finance committee. From 1890 to 1898 he served as a member of the board of trustees of the University.

Mr. Finley was elected to Congress from the fifth district in 1898 and has served continually since that time, being the oldest representative in length of service from the State.

Mr. Finley's son, David E. Finley, Jr., entered the University in 1905 and graduated with an A. B. degree in the class of 1910. He later took a law degree at Georgetown University and is now practising in Philadelphia.
