

DR. MORSE LECTURES AT VANDERBILT UNIV.

Will Go Next Week as Exchange Lecturer From the University.

Dr. Josiah Morse, of the Department of Philosophy and Psychology, will go to Vanderbilt University, Nashville, Tenn., next week as exchange lecturer from the University.

About five years ago the universities of Virginia, North Carolina, South Carolina and Vanderbilt University entered into an agreement whereby each institution would alternately send a member of its faculty each year to one of the other institutions to give a week's lecture. The plan was discontinued during the war, but this year it was undertaken again. Early this spring Prof. George Howe, of the University of North Carolina, came to South Carolina and gave a week's lectures here. Vanderbilt will send a speaker to Virginia and Virginia will send her's to North Carolina.

Dr. Morse, who will probably be at Vanderbilt all the week, will deliver a series of lectures to the students with one, and probably two, lectures to the students and public while at the institution.

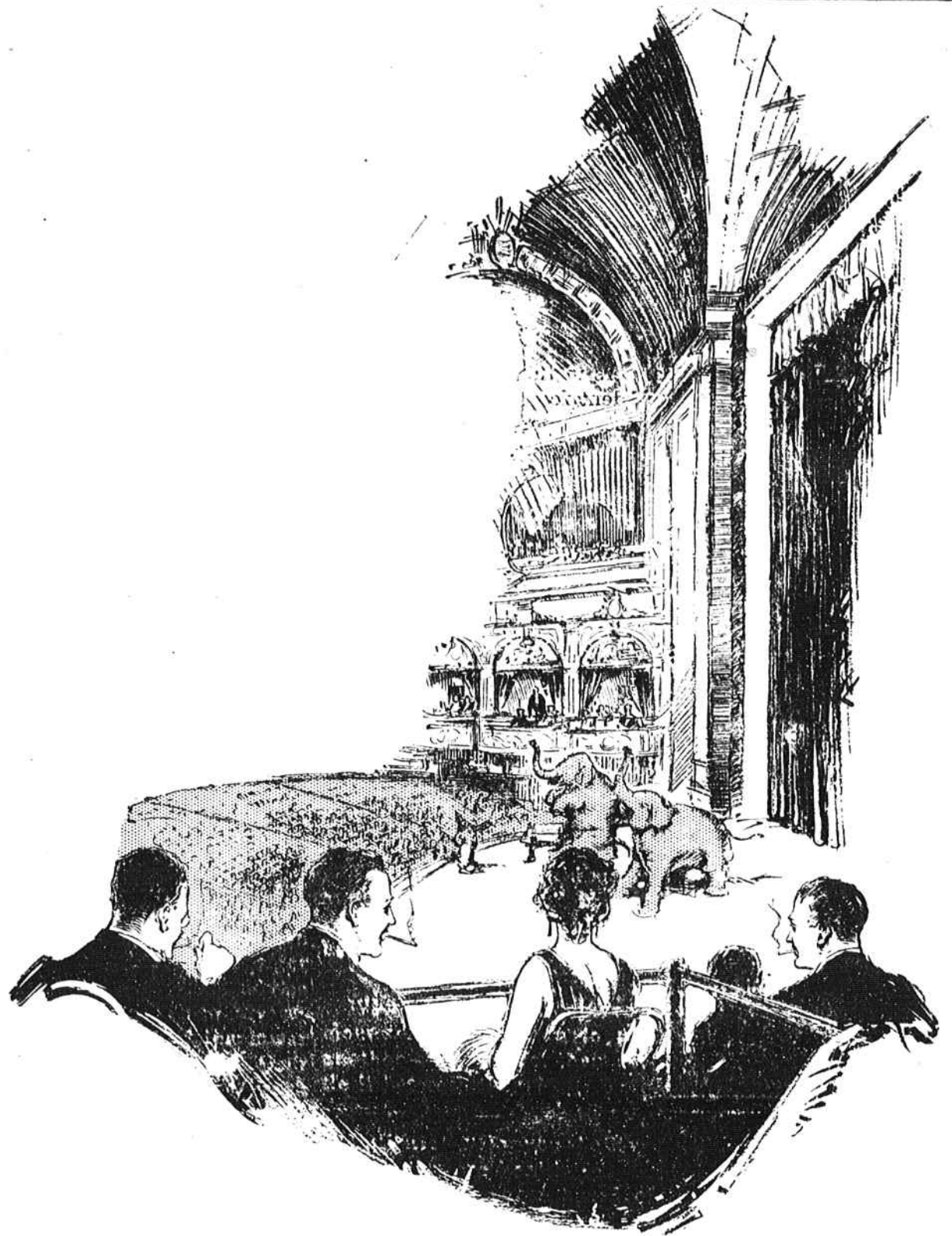
