Other requests made by the University were for the retention of the pharmacy school, a "hands off" policy on the part of the General Assembly on the question of the student activity fee, and a reduction of the tuition for out-of-state students from the proposed \$150 to double the tuition of state students.

As amended the bill now before the Senate committee has the following provisions:
