Two scrimmage games have been held on Manly Field as practice for the men. These have been open to the public, and have attracted a large number of interested onlookers.

Only a small number of injuries have been incurred during practice, and most of these have been of a minor nature. Big Durham, Don Tomlin, Van Edwards, and Art Urbanyi are taking things easy because of knee injuries and George McKovic has two broken ribs. However Edwards is the only one who will not be able to see any service in the game Saturday, although his injury is expected to heal within a week.

Although there are a number of sophomores to step into the ranks as substitutes, Coach McCallister declared that he expected to mold his line from veteran material.

Only the post of center is vacant, caused by the graduation of Ernie Stokes. This position will probably be taken by Frank Kiss. John Burns from Gaffney is expected to see plenty of service also at the pivot position.

In the backfield a number of untried players who combine everything from elusiveness to sheer power will fight for places. "Lit" Durham is the standout at quarterback. He is a rugged player weighing about 170 pounds who has a slight edge on Ralph Dearth, last year's freshman signal caller.

Stadium Has New Features

Scoreboard Is Erected

Public Address System Is Installed For Spectators

With the installation of an amplifying system, Carolina's new steel and concrete stadium has been put into condition at a cost of \$35,000 for this year's 12 game schedule, seven of which will be played in Columbia.

The huge stadium has a seating capacity of 17,000 and is ranked with the finest in the South.

The turf has been patiently tended all summer and is now in the best condition possible.

The public address system will have three speakers on each stand and will keep the spectators supplied with the player's names and other information which should tend to make the game more interesting for the onlookers.

A new concrete fence has been constructed around the stadium and will be completed later.

Two scoreboards on each side of the goal posts have been built and will also serve to aid the spectator in following the game more closely.

Ticket booths have been placed in the wall and concrete floors have been laid under the stands, in the player's dressing rooms and the spectator's rest rooms.


The reserved seat sections have been partitioned off from the general admission sections and the press box is divided in order to give the writers, radio announcers and public address men more convenience.

The other additions to the stadium are a quarter-mile track around the playing field and fences to keep the fans off the field.

This year's Gamecocks will take the field resplendently attired in new uniforms striking enough to attract the attention of every spectator. Bright red jerseys with white stripes on the front and on the arms and with large white numbers on the back combine with silver silk pants with red stripes up the backs of the legs. To top it all the men will wear silver helmets.

Although he expected to make numerous substitutions, Coach McCallister announced that he would probably send the following team into the game Saturday: ends, Bob Johnson and Larry Craig; tackles, Ossie Bramlett and Paul Robelot; guards, Fritz Turner and Paul Gaffney; center, Frank Kiss. The backfield will be composed of Lit Durham, quarterback, Jack Lyon, left-half, Curry Farnham or Jimmie Hinson, right half, and Big Durham or Ed Stillwell, fullback.

To meet the Gamecocks this afternoon, Coach Jake Todd has a veteran line and a number of versatile backs. The team which he will bring to Columbia to provide the opposition for the Gamecocks initial skirmish is expected to be strong defensively. Todd announced at the first of the season that he expected to have a fair team to bring against the Birds.

Season tickets which have been on sale for some time will be offered to the public up until time for the Erskine game at 3 o'clock. There will be a special window at the game to sell the season passes.

The price of the tickets will be \$12.40 which will include seven varsity and three fresh home games. This will include all the home games. The holder of the season ticket may select his seats beforehand and have them reserved.
