

Paul Gaffney Named On All State Team

A Lotta Wind

Football has been the source of a great many stories—tales of victories and a few of defeats, but the story of football's biggest wind, a Golden Tornado from Georgia Tech that blew Cumberland University back to Tennessee 220 to 0, was told recently by the captain of the victims.

Unlike most ex-football players, who like to talk of triumphs, Commissioner George Allen of the District of Columbia heartily enjoyed telling of football's swiftest moving comedy and the part he played in it.

"It was a riot," he roared, laughing so hard he almost fell out of his chair.

"Talk about your point-a-minute teams," he jeered; "They're just a dime-a-dozen. How would you like to have been in the path of a touchdown-a-minute team? I was. That great Georgia Tech team raced over a touchdown for every minute of our game."

Allen explained the time of quarters cut from 15 to eight minutes in this opening game of 1916 in Atlanta, leaving 32 minutes to jibe with Tech's 32 touchdowns.

The commissioner is unimpressed by present day yarns about iron men.

"Say, our starting eleven stood up under that heavy shelling the entire game."

"But there was a reason. Every time a substitute came in all the players yelled. 'Take my place.' The sub couldn't show partiality, so he had to retire to the bench."

Cumberland used strategy on Tech that day.

"We chose to kick off after every touchdown. We figured Tech would then have to run the whole distance of the field instead of around half-way should they recover a fumble or return a short kick," Allen recalled.

"It was every man for himself in trying to dodge Tech's steamroller. One player dropped the ball and yelled to another Cumberland athlete to pick it up but the only cooperation he got was; 'Hell, you dropped it, you pick it up!'"

Tech didn't throw a pass. Allen can't recall a single punt. The Georgians scored every time they got their hands on the ball.

Some of the football marks hung up that day include the largest score, most goals after touchdown, most scoring runs from kickoff, the most ground gained, most first downs and most points in one quarter.

"There was almost mutiny on our side near the end of the Tech game," Allen smiled. "I had to plead with the boys to play and was forced to promise them huge steak dinners. You see, we had to plug along to the finish to get our guarantee."

CAROLINA LOSES TO N. C. TAR HEELS

Before a Home-coming crowd of about 10,000 people the Gamecocks lost their last home game to North Carolina's powerful Tarheels, who subdued them by a score of 14-0.

The Gamecocks almost scored in the first period, but after a drive down the field, lost the ball on North Carolina's 11 yard line.

Neither team was able to score during the second half, although the Gamecocks came close to the marker again in the final period. After several unsuccessful attempts to gain by passing and line plays, South Carolina lost the ball on downs, on the Tarheel 13 yard line.

For the Gamecocks, Henson, Williams, Lit Durham, Curry Farnam, Frank Kiss, Hasel Murray, Paul Gaffney, and Capt. Bob Johnson were the stars of the day.

GAMECOCKS LOSE TO XAVIER ELEVEN

Handicapped by cold weather which made them fumble 8 times, the Carolina Gamecocks lost to Xavier University in Cincinnati by a score of 21-13 in a game played on Thanksgiving day.

Xavier scored in the first period, when, after recovering a Carolina fumble, the team moved the ball down to Carolina's 16 yard line. Then Koprovski hit the line for 8 yards, and lateraled to Cummins, who carried the ball across.

In the second quarter Carolina scored its first touchdown. Carolina received the ball on Xavier's 15 yard line after the officials ruled that Xavier was guilty of pass interference. Jack Lyons made the score.

Xavier scored again in the second period. After a long drive down the field, Xavier had the ball on the Carolina 3 yard line, where the Gamecocks held for three downs, but weakened on the fourth try.

At the beginning of the fourth quarter, Hopkins, Carolina back, intercepted a Xavier pass, and carried it 25 yards to Xavier's 28 yard line. On the next play, Lyons went through guard for a touchdown.

VARSITY TO CLOSE SEASON IN MIAMI

Back from their trip to Cincinnati, the University of South Carolina football team is going through a light week of practice for their game with Miami on Dec. 12.

On Monday and Tuesday the grid-ders were given a rest from their usual hard work, but Wednesday saw them back in uniform again.

Light work on the blocking dummy was followed by a snappy signal drill and calisthenics with Coach Dutch Stammen leading.

The backfield men were given special attention and went through a series of exercises in handling the ball. Coach McCallister drilled the backs in clean handling of the ball so as to lessen fumbling which has proved costly to Carolina's eleven.

After a short practice the men ran several laps on the track, and then were sent to the showers.

Coach McCallister announced that similar light practices would be held this week, and that hard practice would begin on Monday.

Four victories and seven defeats are included on the record of the Carolina Gamecocks this year.

Contests Start In Intramurals Schedule Listed Soon

Competition Will Be Run Off In Elimination Style, One Loss Disqualifying A Team

The first intra-mural football game of the season, which was to be held yesterday afternoon between the Sigma Xi's and the K. A.'s, had to be postponed until Monday because of rain.

The games will be resumed next Monday as the field will not be available today, and there are no scheduled encounters for Saturday. The equipment which was furnished by the athletic department will be handed out to the opposing teams after two o'clock on the day of the game.

With eight tenements entered in this elimination tournament the winner will probably be announced near Christmas time. Only one defeat is necessary to disqualify a team. A tie will not be counted.

After training diligently for the past two weeks the squads were halted in their efforts by the sudden rain storms which rendered playing conditions unsatisfactory.

According to the announcement made by Mr. Jack Crawford, head of the physical education department, who is in charge of the contests, there will be no matches during inclement weather.

At the close of the season a handsome trophy will be presented the winning team, according to J. A. Crawford, director of physical education. If a tenement team is champion, the reward will go to the most valuable player on the team, who will be selected by a committee called for that purpose.

It is necessary that participants in intra-mural football games dress at the gymnasium and all equipment used must be turned in, or the individuals failing to do so will be held responsible, Mr. Crawford said. Equipment may be secured at the gymnasium any time after 2:00 on days of the games.

Handball Meet Held

The first handball tournament ever held at the University will be played at the gymnasium next Tuesday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock, J. A. Crawford, director of physical education, has announced. All students interested in participating are requested to be on hand at that time. Handballs and gloves will be furnished, and attractive medals presented the champion and runner-up.

Both singles and doubles will be played, and a short eleven-point game will be played, two out of three. Those playing doubles will pick their partners.

Drawings will be made just before the beginning of the tournament.

On Tuesday December 15, the highest ranking student players will play a four-side selected from the professors at 3:30 at the gymnasium.

Paul Gaffney, alternate captain of the 1936 Gamecock eleven, climaxed his brilliant football career by making the Associated Press All-State team for the third straight year. He was also chosen on the third Southern Conference team this year. Last year he was the only player in South Carolina to receive honorable mention for All-American. Gaffney is a senior this year and will play his last game for Carolina against Miami University next week.

Coach DeMars Calls Boxers

An urgent call for men in the heavy-weight, light heavy, lightweight, and bantam classes to come out for the University boxing team has been issued by Coach Frank DeMars.

"We have everything a boxer needs and are anxious for more new men to come out for the team," Coach DeMars said. "The first encounter takes place four days after the Christmas holidays, and anyone desiring to participate is urged to come out now and get in shape."

The latest in modern boxing equipment has been secured, making the department better supplied this year than ever before. Boxers are assured of minimum injury by new headgear, body protectors, and other such armor.

In speaking of the men already out, DeMars declared that Frank Jenkins is getting along better than ever before, and that "if he doesn't go through the Conference I'll certainly be surprised."

Three bouts have already been scheduled for the 1937 team. The season opens with P. C. here on Jan. 9, and then the Carolina mittmen go to Raleigh to engage N. C. State. Citadel will furnish the opposition for the Carolina pugilists on Feb. 13 in Columbia. Mr. W. H. Harth announced that this list is not complete and that a number of other teams are expected to be scheduled in the near future.

BIDDY GRIDDERS DEFEAT BULLPUPS

In their final game of the year, the Carolina Biddies defeated the Citadel frosh 25-7 in Charleston on Thanksgiving day.

The Bullpups made the first score of the game in the first quarter after recovering a Carolina fumble on the Carolina 30 yard line. Murphy scored the touchdown, and Huguenin kicked the extra point.

Citadel kicked off, and on the first play after the run-back, Dick Little scored for the Biddies. Lonchar failed to kick the extra point.

The Biddies came through again to make two touchdowns in the second quarter, both scores resulting from long runs. Rampey went over the line to score both counters; Lonchar made the extra point after the first, but a run by Stroud failed to count for the other extra point.

The final touchdown of the game came in the middle of the last quarter, when Robinson skidded left end on a weak side play and went 16 yards to score. The try for the extra point failed, Little's placekick being blocked.

Varsity Cagers Continue Work

Emphasize Scrimmage First Home Game To Be Played Against Presbyterian College On December 15

Carolina's basketball squad has been practicing regularly for the past few weeks, with coach Ted Petoskey whipping the team into shape for the first game, which is to be played with Erskine at Erskine on December 14.

The team has been working on the fundamental plays and principles of the game, with more and more emphasis placed on scrimmages. The team will use a man-to-man defense and will depend a great deal on speed for the offensive part of the game.

Several promising freshmen have been working out with the varsity squad. So far, no definite plans have been made to organize a freshman team, but it is probable that one will be formed later on in the season.

Coach Petoskey has set up a system for checking up on the weaknesses of the players. If a player misses a shot for the basket, the error is recorded, together with his position on the floor when he made the shot. Players and coach can in this way check up on the kind and number of mistakes, and correct them.

An average of about 14 players have been turning out for the practice sessions. Among the outstanding new men on the squad are Jack Crawford, Oliver Wolfe, and Tom Hutto.

The first home game will be played against Presbyterian College on December 15, and it will be followed by another home game with Duke University, on December 17.

Practice was held part of the week with Coach Petoskey absent. After football season is over, a number of candidates from the football team are expected to report for practice.

Bob Johnson, captain of this year's football team, is among those who will probably turn out to strengthen the basketball squad. Johnson was a regular on last year's basketball team, holding down a forward position.

Members of last year's squad already out for practice are Bernard James, who is captain of the team this year, Guy Lipscomb, Goody Taylor, Willis Cantey, and Bill Simpson.

Captain James expressed confidence that the team would make a good showing this year. "With the material that we have, we should be able to win the State Championship this year. I don't think that we will have any trouble getting into the Conference tournament," he said.

Wins Honor Third Time

Five Tigers Win Place Bob Johnson And Jack Lyon Earn Positions On Second Team

For the third straight year Paul Gaffney, who plays guard on the Carolina grid team, has won a berth on the Associated Press All-State football eleven.

Gaffney, who comes from the town of Gaffney, was an almost unanimous choice for the team this year. This mythical team represents the consensus of opinion of sports writers all over South Carolina.

Although Gaffney was the only man picked on the first team, Bob Johnson and Jack Lyon were selected on the second team at end and halfback. Both of these men placed on several writer's first teams, but according to the system of voting, they did not receive enough points to earn positions on the coveted first string.

Nine other Gamecocks were given honorable mention this year. They were Frank Urban, end; Paul Robelot, tackle; Vincent Kelly, guard; Frank Kiss and John Burns, center; Ralph Dearth, Art Urbanyi, J. B. Henson, and Ed Clary, backs.

Only two members of the state champion Furman aggregation made successful bids for places on the first team, Bob King was a overwhelming favorite at the right end post, and June Scott was also named at right half-back.

Clemson, who bowed ingloriously to the Hurricane on Thanksgiving Day, led all the schools by placing five men on this coveted team. Manuel Black, tackle, Bill Bryant, guard, Harold Lewis, center, Joe Berry, quarterback, and Mac Folger, fullback, were the ones to win this honor.

P. C., Erskine, and the Citadel also placed one man each on the first team.
