

Carolina Review Will Go to Press Tomorrow

Magazine to Go on Sale First Of April; Size to Be Increased

"The Carolina Review will go to press Saturday and will be on sale during the first week of April," announced Margaret Hanna, newly elected editor of the "Review."

The "Review," which will be patterned after the first January issue, will be a larger issue and possibly will be one hundred pages. It will contain a short story section; poetry and book review section; a panorama and pertinent articles. The Panorama, which has been enlarged and expanded since the first issue will include short paragraphs written by each departmental editor and various people on campus on questions that are of vital interest and of timely importance to Carolina.

In the short story section there is a psychological story by Anne Seaton; a mystery by Frank Wardlaw; and several sketches done in a humorous way. In the poetry section there are two poems by Dorothy Kilpatrick, "The Watchman" and "Inspiration;" three poems by Mae S. Hammond, first editor of the "Carolina Review," one of which is entitled "Carolina Day," and poems by Elizabeth Teashey, Herb Beitel, Susie D. Johnson and Margaret Hanna. There is also an enlarged book review section including reviews by both students and faculty members. Dick VanderVeen has written a pertinent article entitled "Why Not Economic Democracy?"

The business staff of the "Review" under the direction of Sidney Wise, business manager and Eric Davis, circulation manager, will begin a subscription campaign this week. Saul Lavisky has been appointed publicity manager.

There will be a meeting of the editorial and business staffs Friday in McKissick library in the "Review" office to discuss the layout of the magazine and the material before the issue goes to the printers.

Thirty-four girls who had made reservations and held them until the new term started, did not return to the University of S. C. for the spring semester, Mrs. Arney Childs, dean of women, announced today.

Of the 34, four decided to get married; two took jobs, 19 could not return because of failure in classes; three did not return because of illness, and 8 simply did not show up, and without notification.

There was a waiting list of ten girls willing to come in on telegram notice, when they made their application much earlier in the year. They were notified of the 34 vacancies. One girl came, four didn't answer, and five wired that they had given up hope and enrolled elsewhere.

Dr. Buie began teaching at the opening session of the spring semester on March 4.

A native of Patrick, Chesterfield county, and a graduate of the University of South Carolina, Dr. Buie recently was released from active duty by the Army. During his service, he received the Order of the Red Star by the Russian government for his work as geologist with the Persian Gulf command during which he had played an important part in establishing and maintaining supply routes from the Persian Gulf to Northern Iran for the purpose of delivering critical materials to the Russian army. He also received the Bronze Star medal for meritorious service in the United States army.

After he was graduated from South Carolina in 1936 with a B.S. degree, Dr. Buie earned an M.S. degree at Lehigh, and the degrees of M.A. and Ph.D. at Harvard, teaching engaging in research at both institutions.

Dr. Buie left Harvard in May, 1937, to take part in the geological exploration of Seaboard Oil company's newly acquired concession in Iran and Afghanistan.

During this period, he was in charge of a party doing oil and metals reconnaissance in Afghanistan.

Returning to the United States in 1941, Dr. Buie accepted an assignment with the Standard Oil company of Texas. In September, 1942, he left at the request of the army's chief of engineers to accept a commission in the corps of engineers, rank of major.

Dr. Buie was on troop duty with an engineer battalion for a few months before being transferred to staff duty with the Persian Gulf command, during which he also served as consultant to both the Russian and Iranian governments.

Prior to his discharge from active service, Dr. Buie also served as executive officer in the Paris office of the Foreign Liquidation commissioner.
