Mrs. Thomas Butler Pearce, 1808 Catawba Avenue, has given McKissick library \$150 for the purchase of books in memory of her husband, according to an announcement made by Alfred Rawlinson, librarian. These books will be marked with a special plaque in his name.

Mr. Pearce had lived in Columbia since he was 12 years old. At the time of his death he was president of the Pearce-Young-Angel Co.

He served two terms as senator in the state legislature. From the head of the Richland County Democratic party, he was made chairman of the South Carolina Democratic party in 1946. He was serving in this position at the time of his death.

He was a trustee of Columbia college. When the South Carolina Research, Planning, and Development board was organized, he was chosen to be chairman.

Mr. Pearce died April 15, 1947.
