The 21-year-old junior stated that he did not have his campaign platform for release when the paper went to press.

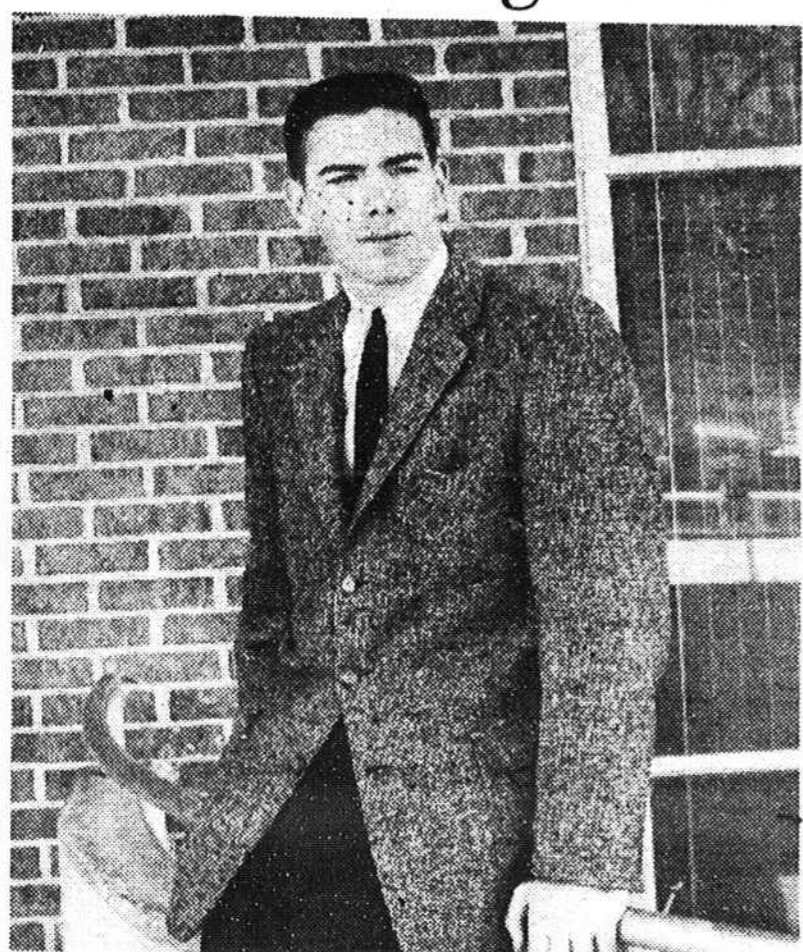

## Euphradian Adds Eight New Members In February Initiation Ceremonies

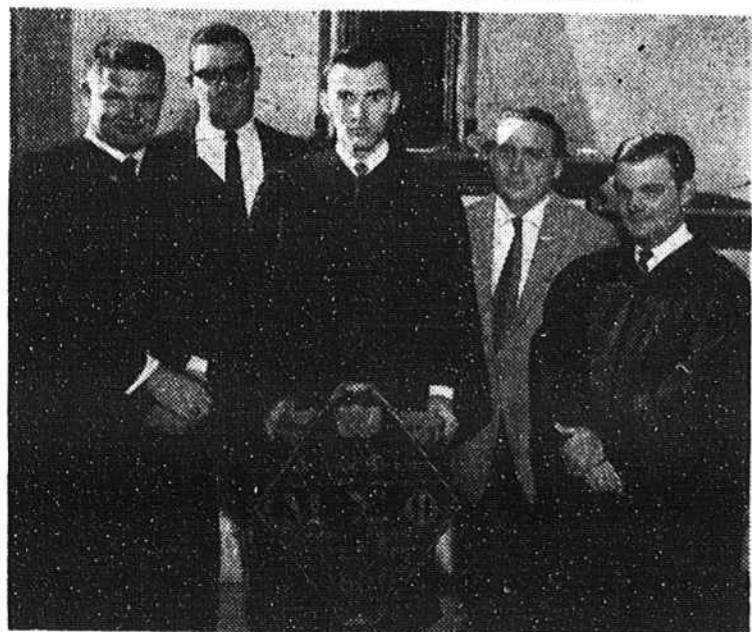
Euphradian Society initiated eight new members in its regular monthly installation for February recently.
