# Convocations Scheduled Daily During IF Week At Carolina

## Expansion Continues On Campus

Despite some delays due to weather conditions, construction of new buildings at Carolina is continuing at a pace which should have all of them ready for occupancy next fall.

The addition to the College of Engineering, which extends the building to encompass the entire south side of the block between Sumter and Main streets, has been completed and accepted from the contractor. The addition includes a large classroom, laboratories and faculty offices.

Razing of Steward's Hall, adjoining the College of Engineering, is virtually complete and construction will start in about two weeks on another small addition which will house additional offices for civil and electrical engineering faculty, a 150-seat lecture hall, and a meeting room for the student engineering society.

The 10-story women's residence hall at Pickens and Devine streets, which will be a major feature of the Columbia skyline, is rising steadily. The sixth floor is now being poured, and the general contractor and sub-contractors are "hard at work and making good progress," said Dr. W. H. Patterson, dean of the university, who is in overall charge of new construction activities.

The new dual unit of seven-story "vell block" men's residence halls is progressing approximately on schedule. The roof of one of the units was poured about a week ago, and the second unit is now about three floors high.

The third—and highest—floor of the Life Sciences building is now being poured.

Pouring is nearly complete of the second floor of a five-story housing unit for married students in University Terrace.

A small building to house a neutron generator for nuclear research in the Department of Physics is virtually complete.

Dr. Patterson said bids will be opened Feb. 20 for an addition to Currell College which will provide additional classroom space, faculty offices, and other needed accommodations.

## Students Top \$35,000 Mark In RSVP Drive

Carolina students have contributed approximately \$35,287 to the Greater University Fund to date, announced Mike Sheheen, student co-chairman, yesterday.

The student phase of the fund drive was recently brought to a close on campus. In a final effort to reach all Carolina students, letters were mailed to commuters.

Total gifts to the fund are in excess of \$850,000. On Tuesday, more than 50 key workers with the Advance Gifts Phase of the Greater University Fund met and obtained pledge cards at a luncheon meeting. Yesterday, 100 Columbia women of the Alumnae Division of Richland County organized their drive during a coffee hour at Russell House.

The Greater Columbia Kick-off Banquet is scheduled for 8:00 P.M. on February 15 in the Russell House. Several Carolina coeds will serve as hostesses during the evening and student entertainment will be a part of the program.

A recent gift to the Greater University Fund was an endowment by Columbia businessman Winchester Graham, which will provide a supplement of \$2,000 each year for a distinguished USC professor.

Seniors who have not turned in activity cards to the "Garnet and Black" must do so by next Friday, February 9. No cards will be accepted after that date. Blank cards are available in the "Garnet and Black" office, Room 210, Russell House.

IF Week, formerly Religious Emphasis Week, declares as its goals: to develop an awareness of a relationship to God, to acquire reverence, to build devotion in worship, and to learn to explain truth to other people.

The Rev. Joseph W. Mathews of Austin, Tex., will lead Protestant convocations. The Catholic convocations leader will be the Rev. Edward A. Doyle of New Orleans, La. Rabbi Burton L. Podoll of Charleston will conduct the Jewish convocations.

Mr. William Stringfellow, widely known speaker and lawyer from New York City will lead special convocations held for the first time in the Law School.

Group leaders for the various denominational groups are the Rev. James R. Stephenson, Lutheran, Clarksburg, W. Va.; Don Thompson, Methodist, Madison, N. J.; Coit R. Thompson, Jr., Baptist, Rock Hill; Dr. Manford G. Gutzke, Presbyterian, Decatur, Ga.

Convocations will be held each day Monday through Thursday at 10:30 a.m. The Protestant convocation will be held in the Naval Armory, the Roman Catholic convocation in Russell House Assembly Room, the Jewish convocation in Russell House, Room 204, and the Law School convocation in the Law School.

## History Department Has New Professor

Professor John Steven Watson has been appointed by the USC Department of History as its sixth

visiting professor from Oxford (England) University.

A graduate of St. John Baptist College and Merton College, Oxford, Prof. Watson is Senior Censor of Christ Church, Oxford. He is the author of "The Law and Working of the Constitution, 1660-1914" and "The Reign of George III."

In the spring semester, Prof. Watson will teach courses in "The European Inheritance: 19th and 20th Centuries," and "Studies in British History Since 1750."

While at the University, he is scheduled to speak at the annual meeting of the Mississippi Valley Historical Assn. and the Conference on Early American History.

In the summer Prof. Watson will teach at Harvard University and in the fall semester at the University of Iowa.
