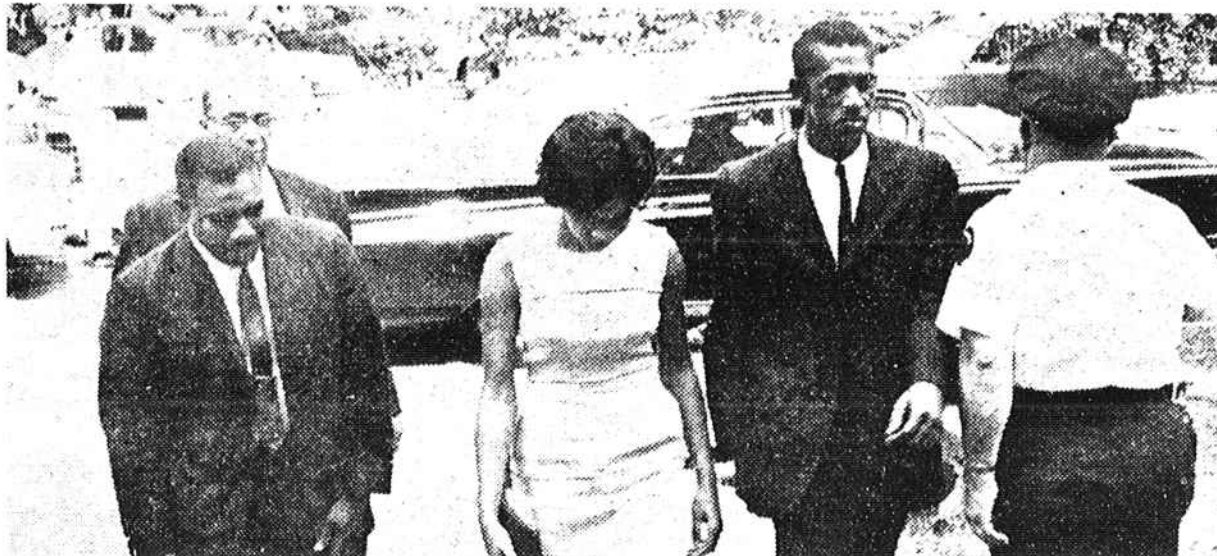

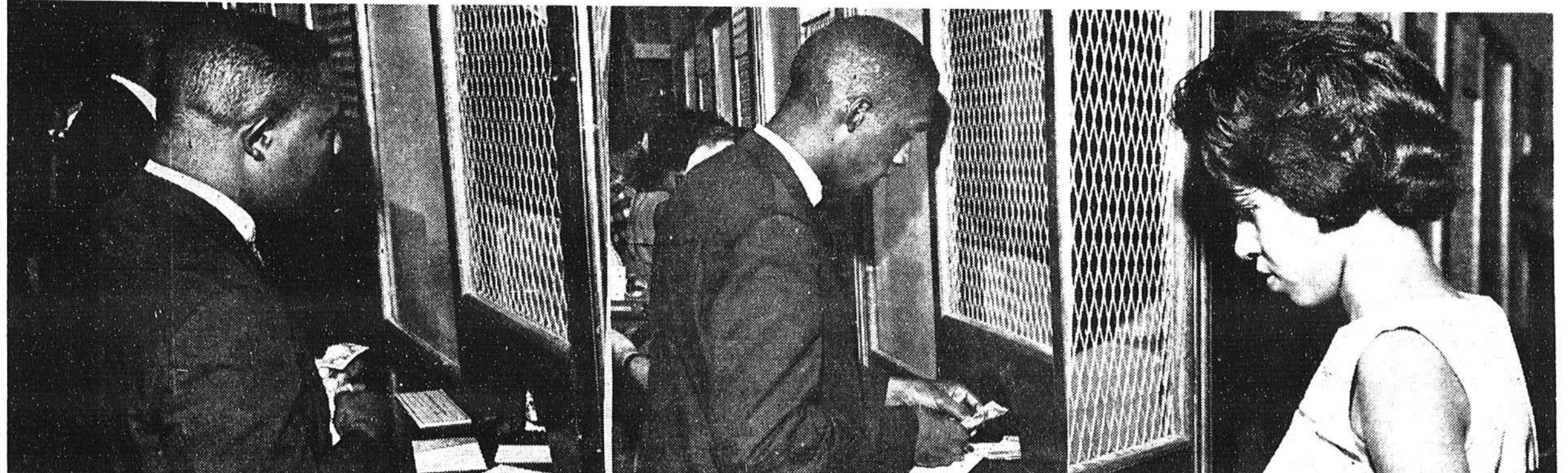

Students' Briefing Continues

Orientation Set For Latecomers

A late orientation schedule will be offered Friday, September 13, for freshmen who missed the regular orientation program. Attendance at these meetings is compulsory.

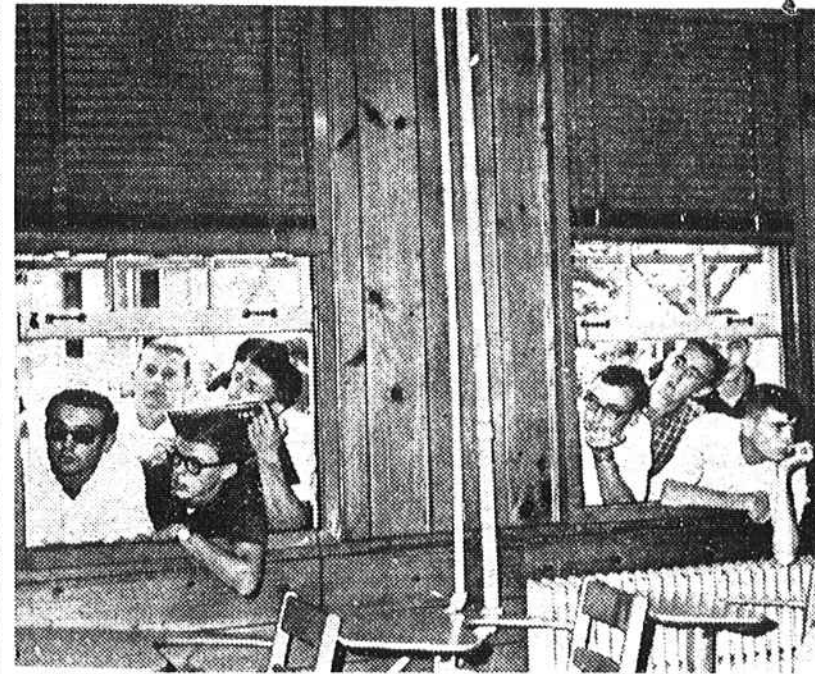
New students will assemble in the Russell House Auditorium at 8:30 a.m. Dean C. H. Witten, Dean of Students; Dean L. E. Cooper, Dean of Men; and Dean Elizabeth Clotworthy, Dean of Women, will greet the students.

After a ten-minute break at 9:30, Dean Witten will explain the academic life of the university. At 10:45 a.m. orientation counselors will present material concerning the counseling service, religious life, health service, insurance, scholarships, and loans available to freshmen.

The students will reassemble in the Russell House Auditorium where Mr. Paul Fidler will speak about University policies on part-time employment, cultural opportunities, and disaster control (see page 6). Social and extra-curricular activities will also be explained.

The program will be completed with instructions on registration procedures. A large percentage of freshmen fail to complete their first year of college because they are not prepared for the rigors of college life. This orientation program is designed to bridge this transition from high school to college as gently as possible, said Dean C. H. Witten.

As of today 1,485 students have completed this orientation program: 38 students in Journalism, 56 in Nursing, 23 in Secretarial Science, 48 in Nursing, 180 in Engineering, 189 in Education, 649 in Arts and Sciences, and 322 in Business Administration.

IFC Rush Convocation Starts Greeks; Freshmen Pledging Standards Set

Ten days of frantic fraternity rush began 8 p.m. Wednesday night in the Field House with approximately 400 persons attending an opening convocation.

The convocation, first to be held at USC to introduce fraternities to interested persons, was presided over by L. Eugene Cooper, Dean of Men, who expressed administrative endorsement of fraternity rush.

In order to be eligible to pledge, students must have scored "5" or better on the entrance examination or have a 2.0 g.p.a. for the previous semester. At least 12 credit hours must have been carried.

Bill Thomason, Inter-Fraternity Council president, presented a

movie "The 2nd Will Make You a Man" to illustrate what is derived from fraternal relations.

Financial obligations of fraternity membership were explained by Gean Martin, treasurer of the IFC. Martin stated that the average cost of membership in a fraternity comes to approximately \$2.50 a week.

Those qualified who wished to rush were required to pay a fee of \$2.00 to register. Open house for registrants was held last night and will be held again tonight on fraternity row. Rushes must visit all houses from 5:30 to 10 p.m. Smokers will be held on Saturday and Sunday, Sept. 14 and 15, for those who are invited to attend.

Three nights of off-campus parties will begin Monday night with Chi Psi, Phi Kappa Sigma, Pi Kappa Phi, and Sigma Phi Epsilon leading off.

Following on Tuesday night will be Kappa Alpha, Kappa Sigma, Lambda Chi Alpha, Sigma Chi, and Sigma Nu.

Alpha Tau Omega, Phi Delta Beta, Phi Epsilon Pi, Pi Kappa Alpha, and Sigma Alpha Epsilon will conclude on Wednesday night, Sept. 18.

There will be stag invitational parties at each fraternity house Sept. 19 from 7 to 12 p.m. Sept. 20, bids will be picked up by rushes between 5 and 7:15 p.m. in Room 204 of Russell House. This phase of rush will come to a close on Sept. 20 when fraternities will receive new pledges from 5 to 7:30 p.m.

The presidents of the fourteen fraternities as introduced by Mark Alexander, IFC secretary, are as follows: Chi Psi, Bobby Plunkett; Sigma Phi Epsilon, Warren Hilton; Sigma Alpha Epsilon, Lloyd Hendricks; Kappa Alpha, Buddy

Barker; Sigma Nu, Marion Burns; Alpha Tau Omega, Pringle Boyle; Lambda Chi Alpha, Wendel Wilson; Phi Epsilon Pi, Mark Lehman; and Phi Kappa Sigma, Doug Elmore.

Also, Phi Delta Theta, Mark Waddell; Pi Kappa Alpha, Gean Martin; Kappa Sigma, Les Dickert; Sigma Chi, Tim Quinn; and Pi Kappa Phi, Brooks Curran.

Any student who has not reserved a copy of the 1964 *Garnet and Black*, or signed up to have his picture taken, will have a final opportunity to do so during the week of September 16 through 20. The *Garnet and Black* room will be open from 2:00 to 6:00 every afternoon of that week. The cost will be \$2.25. Students who do not reserve an annual will not receive a copy next spring.

Disaster Control

(Read, Study, and Post in Your Room)

Alert Signal — Steady blast of 3-5 minutes' duration on siren, horn, or whistle.

Students living off-campus: Proceed to your residence. Drive carefully — traffic may be your greatest danger.

Students living on-campus: Go to your room; close the windows; assemble blankets, pillow, flashlight, battery-powered radio, candy bars, or other well-wrapped dry food, prescriptions or other special medical supplies. Dress in comfortable clothing and shoes (slacks recommended for women), put on rain gear as outer garment. THEN WAIT IN YOUR ROOM FOR THE NEXT SIGNAL.

Take Cover Signal — Wailing tone or a series of short blasts of three minutes' duration. Pick up items you have assembled, turn off the lights, leave the room and close the door, proceed CALMLY, QUIETLY AND DELIBERATELY to your assigned shelter. In the shelter, follow instructions promptly and cheerfully.

Students who are not housed on the campus should proceed immediately to their off-campus residences in event of a military or natural disaster, and from this follow the plan in effect for that residential district.

Supplementary instructions for the faculty and administrative staff not assigned to Civil Defense Corps duties are being issued directly to them.

Dean Fellers has developed an intensive training-education program. YOU CAN EXPECT DISASTER-SURVIVAL DRILLS — with or without prior knowledge that they will take place.
