



• If you think the ideal way to figure numerical problems is to have someone else do it, you're probably lacking a bit in the area of math appreciation. So truck on down to Swearingen Engineering Center and check out a free exhibit, "Computer in Your Pocket: The History of Hand-Held Calculators," chronicling the quest from bones to pebbles to electronic pocket calculators.

The exhibit is displayed in room 1A10 and features more than 60 rare and unusual calculators. Included are the oldest mechanical pocket calculator, made in 1966, and a multiplication device made of bones that was used by 17th century astronomers and mathematicians.

There are also hands-on displays where you can tinker with some of the various number-figuring devices. The exhibit, which is on a two-year tour sponsored by the Smithsonian Institution's Traveling Exhibition Service, will be in Swearingen through Nov. 13.
