House should mean, Patterson and Moore agreed.

From the urbane to the mundane, the staff handles White House affairs at every level.

Patterson said the staff publishes an "advance manual," about four inches thick, which covers procedure for handling presidential visits, from security matters to massive balloon drops in huge auditoriums.

Ayres then took the floor and commented that the governor's staff works in much the same way, if on a smaller scale.

One major difference Ayres noted is that the governor's cabinet is elected by the public, not appointed, which sometimes creates problems when cabinet members' own political ambitions and values conflict with the governor's policy objectives.

"As government gets more complex, the simple proximity of people around the executive gets more important," Ayres said. That proximity, coupled with personal loyalty, is necessary to maintain agenda control, he said.

Moore added near the end of the colloquium that Patterson's book, published last year, was "long overdue."

In the *New York Times* book review, the book was reviewed favorably by Christopher Matthews, former chief staff member, to Tip O'Neill and author of *Hardball*, his own book on Washington power.

Patterson served until last year as a senior staff member of the Advanced Study Program of the Brookings Institution, a respected national think tank.

provide more options for students such as restricted visitation in some buildings, quiet areas and no smoking dorms," Foulke said. "But we have no concrete plans for the future in this area, and the discussion has limited to regents and legislators."

Only one administrator from the 15 universities surveyed said changes were planned in the visitation policies. Pat Newland, assistant director of staff and student development at the University of Texas, said the university is considering extending visitation to include more morning hours.

"We do not favor overnight visitation for security and privacy reasons. We do not see it as a moral issue," Newland said.

Newland said opposite sex visitation is allowed on Tuesday through Thursday from noon until 11:30 p.m. Visitation is from noon until 1:30 a.m. on the weekends.

But other universities surveyed such as the University of Michigan, Florida State, East Carolina, University of Maryland and Clemson are not planning any changes in their visitation policies.

Florida State offers a variety of visitation options and has no plans to change these options, Emily Moorelock of Florida State University's Student Development Office.

"Personally, I think it is difficult to legislate morality issues and then to enforce them. You also have the question of whether these students are adults or children," Moorelock said.

Other colleges surveyed who are not planning to change their visitation policy include the University of Maryland at Baltimore, University of Alabama, the University of Nebraska, East Carolina, the University of Arkansas, the University of Missouri.

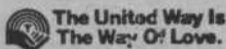

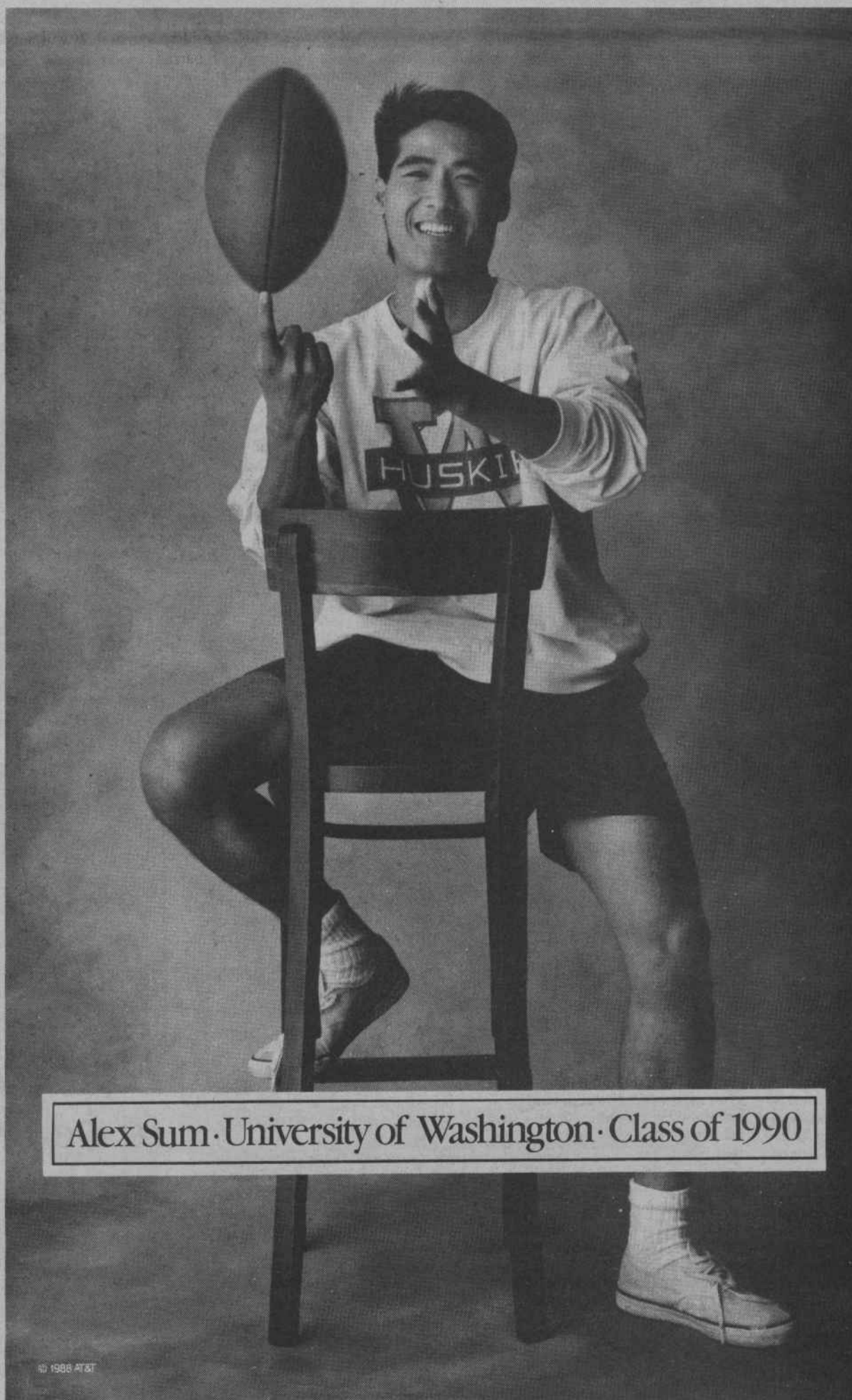
