Former South Carolina football player Tim High could face up to six months in jail if convicted of charges that he bet on college and professional basketball games as well as NFL teams.

Assistant solicitor Greg Hembree said Wednesday he rejected High's application for a pretrial intervention program because of a previous conviction. That program allows first-time criminal offenders to perform community service inkeeping a clean record.

Hembree said High, 22, did not Leon Lott testified at a preliminary

qualify for the program because he had a 1987 conviciton in Raleigh, N.C., on a misdemeanor charge of damage to property.

High also was arrested in Columbia in February 1989 for possession with intent to distribute drugs. Though those charges were dropped, Hembree said it indicated High was "back getting involved in criminal activity.'

High, a South Carolina nose guard from 1987-1989, has not Tim High been indicted on gambling charges, and Hembree said he did not know stead of going to jail in return for when High would go before the Richland County grand jury.




