USC gets 'easy' win over Davidson, 85-57

The Gamecocks coasted to what USC basketball coach George Felton labeled an "easy" 85-57 victory over the Davidson Wildcats Wednesday night at Belk Arena in Davidson, N.C.

"I didn't expect it to be this easy," said Coach Felton after the

"I think they made it easy for themselves," said Davidson coach Bob McKillop. "Their defense forced us into bad shots but shooting below 20 percent in the first half doesn't help.'

The Wildcats had an extremely sluggish start. They fell behind by a score of 9-0 and didn't hit their first basket until about five and a half minutes into the contest.

Freshman guard Jason Zimmerman broke the scoring drought for Davidson at 14:45 in the first half with a three-pointer. USC then scored on a short jumper by forward Joe Rhett. Davidson responded with another threepointer, this time by Davidson junior guard Paul Denmond.

USC then committed a costly turnover. To make matters worse, a foul by Jeff Roulston sent Zimmerman, the Wildcats' best shooter, to the line for two shots. With 13:05 remaining in the first half, Zimmerman hit both shots to cut the Gamecock lead to only three points, 11-8.

Zimmerman followed another Rhett jump shot with two free throws, this time courtesy of a Bo Popovic foul. Davidson once again

trailed by only three, 13-10.

At that point, USC guard Barry Manning refused to let the Wildcats get any closer. Manning scored 10 points in the next 12 minutes, including a three-pointer at the buzzer to end the half on a high note for the Gamecocks.

After the game, Coach McKillop said, "Barry Manning was the catalyst for them both offensively and defensively."

Manning was leading or tying every offensive and defensive category for USC at the half.

The Gamecocks made it look easy in the second half, particularly on dazzling drives by Jo Jo English. The junior guard finished with 13 points overall, 11 of them in the second half.


The leading scorer for the night was junior forward Joe Rhett, who tied a personal best by totaling 21 points in the game. Rhett also grabbed a game-high nine rebounds.

Tonight some shots just fell for me," said a modest Rhett, "and I played a little more aggressive."
The 25th-ranked Gamecocks im-

proved their record to 14-4 while Davidson dropped to 5-12.

Metro match pits **USC** and Tigers

Elliot Perry, the lightning-quick, do-everything point guard for Memphis State, is definitely a familiar face for the USC basketball

In three Tiger victories over USC this past season, Perry scored a total of 57 points for an average of 19 points per game.

The most heartbreaking loss of all occurred in Frank McGuire Arena this past season. With four seconds left, the Gamecocks took a one point lead after two free throws by Eric Sykes.

On the ensuing possession, USC guard Bojan Popovic slipped near midcourt leaving Perry wide open to shoot a 22-foot jumper from three-point land at the buzzer to defeat the Gamecocks 74-72, in front of 9,000 heartbroken USC

The win was the first in Columbia under Memphis State head coach Larry Finch, breaking a three-game losing skid at Carolina

"We can't go up with revenge, though," said Joe Rhett after the Davidson win. "We're still trying to win the regular season in the Metro, and I believe we've got the team that can do it."

This season is not a reflection of the one a year ago. The Gamecocks are coming off an impressive road win against Davidson, 85-57.

A sellout crowd of 11,200 is expected to be on hand Saturday at the Mid-South Coliseum in Memphis, Tenn. USC (14-4) will be taking on the Memphis State University Tigers (9-7) in a Metro Conference matchup. The Tigers lead the series 12-5.

Memphis State has posted conference wins over Louisville and Tulane while losing conference matchups to Virginia Tech and Southern Mississippi on the road.

Anyone familiar with the USC program knows the starting five is made up of four local town heroes from the Columbia area, with the fifth product, Jeff Roulston, from Summerville. Memphis State will have their own share of local heroes in their starting lineup Saturday night.

USC's backcourt of JoJo English and Barry Manning, both from the Columbia area, will match up against the Tiger backcourt of Elliot Perry and Tony Madlock, both of Memphis.

Forwards Michael Glover and Joe Rhett, another pair from the Columbia area, will match up against Memphis State forwards Earnest Smith and Anthony Douglas, also from Memphis.

Center Jeff Roulston will go against center Todd Mundt, a 7-foot, 240 pound product of Jackson, Tenn.

This game is very important for USC as the Gamecocks need to gain some ground on Metroleading Southern Mississippi. The game will be broadcast live on the Gamecock Sports Radio Network, including WVOC-AM 56 in

Not unlike country star Lee Greenwood, I, too, am "proud to be an American" and if I can show my support for the troops by watching the Super Bowl, then heck, I'll do it.

In case you missed it (under-

standably so, many viewers had their eyes glued to the war updates on CNN Sunday) the Buffalo Bills and the New York Giants each won their respective conference championships.

The last time these two teams met was on Dec. 15, 1990. The Bills prevailed in a close game over the Giants in front of a hostile, sellout crowd at Giants

True, the Bills barely won, but the Giants are now without their offensive leader and starting quarterback, Phil Simms. They also won't be playing at home.

Forget the fact that Giant backup quarterback Jeff Hostetler is coming off the biggest win of

his life against a team that was expected to "three-peat" in the Super Bowl.

A brief history lesson proves back-up quarterbacks can get up for an important game one week and completely flop the next. This season Oiler backup "Commander Cody" Carlson led Houston into the playoffs one week and fizzled in the playoffs the following week.

The last time the Giants were in the Super Bowl, starting quarterback Simms won the Super Bowl MVP en route to leading New York over the Denver Broncos by a score of 39-20. The only thing Simms will be throwing on Sunday is one of his crutches in disgust after the Giants lose.

To compare the two, Buffalo starter Jim Kelly is the highestrated quarterback in the NFL while Hostetler ranks below even Bill second-stringer Frank Reich. (Will it be long before people start praising the Kelly/Reich combo the way people have praised Montana/ Young?)

Beyond the passers though, the Bills dominate in almost every other category too. Leading the ground attack for Buffalo is running back Thurman Thomas, who was first in the AFC in rushing with 1,297 yards this season and arguably is the best all-around back in pro football today. Buffalo averaged 130 yards per game as a team in '90. The Giants are close

behind, though, with veteran running back Ottis Anderson leading a ground game that averaged 128.1 yards per game.

Bill receiver Andre Reed is both fearless and peerless. (Is there anyone more lethal going over the middle?) New York's receivers aren't worth mentioning.

For all the hype and attention given to Giant linebacker Lawrence Taylor, the best pass rusher in this game is defensive end Bruce Smith, with apologies to "LT," (who is a bona fide future hall of famer and worthy of mention along with the elite defenders of all time, Dick Butkus and Joe Greene) Smith has simply had a better season. Smith registered 20 sacks this season to LT's 10.5.

The one area the Giants do excel at over the Bills is pass coverage. Veteran Giant cornerback Everson Walls gambles at times but is always capable of making the big play. His six interceptions were third in the NFC this season. He and his counterparts won't get any rest against Kelly and Reed on Sunday, though. The Bills will win

The New York Giants and the Buffalo Bills are set to clash at 6:18 p.m. this Sunday in Tampa Stadium in front of a sellout crowd of over 72,000. The game will be broadcast live by ABC-TV, channel 25 in Columbia.
