"They have eggs figured in myths of creation and religious explanations of how things came to be," he said. "The egg in its 'eggness' precedes the gen-However, he said, in art and general practice, difdering of creatures. It's something that came before anything else."

However, the Christians, who believe the chicken came before the egg, were able to "Christianize

eggs better than rabbits," Lewis said. The chicklet inside represents the resting soul of his resurrection from the dead.

"About three or four centuries ago, the new year began about now," he said. "In all previous civilizations, there were ceremonies to usher in the new year. Easter is in the long scheme of things a greeting of the new year."

Lewis said Christianity took up local traditions and festivals and "Christianized" them to gain converts, though the Easter bunny and eggs have lost their religious meaning over the centuries.




