found. That's the sixth increase in seven years and close to 1985's all-time high of 13.3 percent. In 1993, 20 percent of the USC freshman class smoked daily, according to a campus study.

The UCLA institute's survey reported that freshmen alcohol use is down. Only 53.2 percent surveyed said they drink on a regular basis, a dramatic drop from 1981's 75.2 percent.

Carolina's Alcohol and Drug Program coordinator, Rick Gant, said the university's study found that 81 percent of USC freshmen drink, but only a third of those drink once or more a week.

"Generally, freshmen drink more, seniors drink less," Gant said. "The process is self-selective. Some of those freshmen aren't in school for their senior year."

# Taneyhill, teammate to pay hotel damages

CHARLESTON (AP)-South Carolina quarterback Steve Tanevhill and a teammate have agreed to pay for furniture damaged in a hotel room this past week-

Taneyhill and John Healy were staying at a Day's Inn in downtown Charleston Saturday night, and the pair have agreed to pay \$75 for a broken chair, according to a police report. Two telephones also were damaged, according to

The Day's Inn has decided not to press charges, police spokesman Charles

Taneyhill met with South Carolina football coach Brad Scott Monday morning to tell him of the incident, said Kerry Tharp, USC's associate athletics director for media relations.

"No action was taken other than that meeting, and it's our understanding that those involved have apologized and will pay for the damages," Tharp said.

Tharp said Taneyhill was at the hotel with a group of USC students, most of whom were not athletes. It was not immediately clear who was responsible for damaging the furniture. Tharp said the broken chair was not in Taneyhill's

The Medical University of South Carolina has been fielding tough questions about a proposed partnership with a local private hospital.

A crowd of 200 gathered Monday as lawmakers and representatives of other hospitals criticized the proposed partnership between MUSC and for-profit Trident Regional Health Systems.

"Is this merger the proper use of state taxpayer money?" asked attorney Susan Smythe, a board member of Roper Health Systems, a competing hospital system. "The taxpayers are being asked to underwrite the demise of their health care alternatives.

State Rep. Mike Rose, R-Summerville, organized the meeting to discuss the

But Marion Woodbury, the chief executive officer of University Medical Associates, the private practice group of MUSC physicians, promised "mammoth meetings and a world of details."

He dismissed complaints that MUSC is "trying to slip this through under the cover of darkness.'

Woodbury said the proposed lease of the MUSC facilities must be approved by the Commission on Higher Education, the Joint Bond Committee of the General Assembly and the state Budget and Control Board.

"The bottom line is I don't think the Medical University can get a major merger without the approval of the legislature," Rose said.

State Sen. Ernie Passailaigue, D-Charleston, agreed, saying "they will have a long and arduous process.
