the \$20 price he had originally worked out.

Dubinsky said the main problem was an information "I think there's a lot going on we don't know about," said Dubinsky. "I think this is a scam if this has happened more than once."

Dubinsky's fall class was reimbursed about \$11 each. When Dubinsky found the same problems this spring he had his students send back the readers and has stopped using the packets all together.

Jeff Verver, a CAPCO representative, said the overcharging was "a clerical error that happened on our part" and is not a usual happening.

According to Verver, publishers have two ways of contracting copyright clearance. Some publishers, especially the larger companies, charge per set and will wait until the final number of students is available. Others, like the company involved in Dubinsky's instance, want the money up front and will decide the price based on the estimate.

Verver said students can find out the breakdown of the price of a course packet by calling the representative at the University Bookstore.

Jenny Roboni of Universal Copies said they work with

the Copyright Clearance Center, a non-profit organization. The clearance center lists pre-approved copyrights, publishers, and rates. On average, one page cost between 3 cents and

Universal Copies rarely sells at the University Bookstore. They sell one course packet there, and Roboni said they

work to reduce the price and keep the price down. "Copyrights are done at no extra expense to the student,"

David Berube, a theatre and speech professor, said he cancelled the use of a course packet after realizing that

the cost was "outrageously expensive"- nearly \$100. Berube and Dubinsky both said they will discontinue the use of study packets.

According to Berube, the same materials that are often put in the course packets can be reserved at the library and students can copy these material themselves and avoid paying copyright charges.

Dubinsky, who plans on going back to textbooks, said, "I can count on the price of a textbook."




