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Student Activity fees would not fund T-shirts for the members of the organizations to wear, but they would fund T-shirts that would be sold for revenue.

"It is difficult to be consistent because everyone has different needs, but when there are similar needs we are consistent," Haller said.

The committee also had numerous requests for funding for travel. The committee decided not to award money for meals, but did pay a portion of travel and lodging. If the trip was in-state, the organization would not receive funds for lodging.

According to Martin, there are a lot of planned trips to Chicago this year. If one organization asked for \$100 a person and another asked for \$600 a person, then the committee would give "\$100 across the board."

Almost every organization requested money for printing. The committee decided to cut funding for printing under 100 copies. This is because the SG copier is available to student organizations. They may make 100 copies per use.

The committee cut at least \$4,000 from the total requests for printing costs of the 71 organizations. The SG budget allows for \$2,000 for the copier. The committee funded some larger printing requests.

The committee also denied requests for supplies from Student Life organizations. This includes about 14 organizations that are mostly service oriented.

According to both Carothers and Martin, the Student Life budget should cover the cost of supplies. Student Life receives a total of \$252,300 from student activity fees.

Martin said Student Life asks the treasurer of each organization to cover some of the supply costs, such as toner cartridges for the copiers, banner paper, pens, etc.

One of the service organizations that faced a significant cut was Carolina Cares. Although Carolina Cares received \$1,374, their annual service project to USC, the University Tree Lighting and Diversity Celebration, only received \$478 out of a request for \$1,454.38.

"We light trees every year at my house for \$50," Martin said.

The committee maintained the university should help fund the project because it is a university tradition.

"Why can't the university pay for the

tree...the tree is not just the students', they (Carolina Cares) should not have to pay for all of it," Haller said.

Another problem the committee encountered were conflicts of interest. For example, Brian Calub, a member of the committee, made recommendations for Campus Coalition for Literacy. Calub is the treasurer of the organization.

"Everything we do is small townish, everyone has connections," Martin said. "It is impossible to eliminate conflicts of interest...we review the recommendations. That's why we have a committee; (we operate as a) checks and balance system."

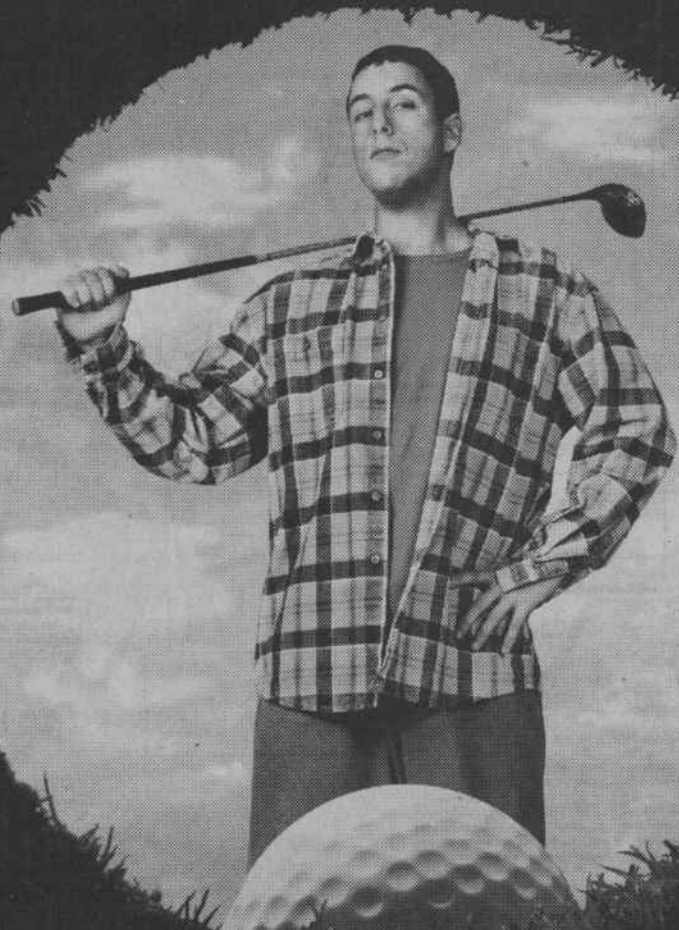
Philosophy Colloquium today

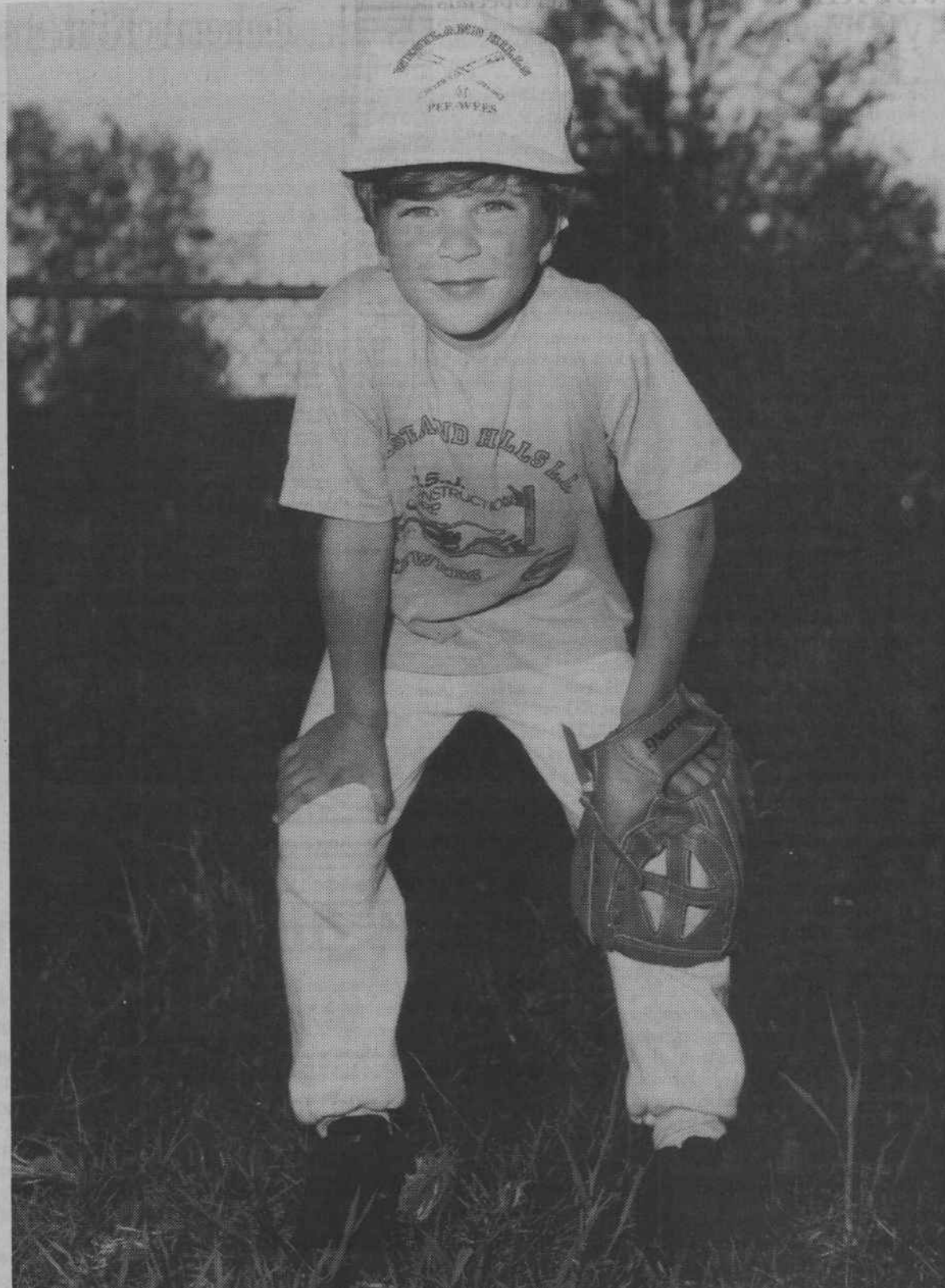
