He plans to work for the Organization of African Unity, which requires a knowledge of more than one language.


Missihoun stresses to people he comes in contact with to "broaden your horizons."


race-relations forums The SG vice president's main job is to be the head of the SG Senate, and Franklin said that would be his first priority.
