Christian bands are becoming more and more popular as the limits of popular music have expanded. South Carolina's local music scene, however, has been slow to catch on with this growing trend. Until now.

As one of the few Christian bands in Columbia, Silers Bald makes powerful music with a powerful message. The band's deep faith in God and inspiring live performances are well-known among Columbia's Christian community.

With the recent release of their debut CD climbing, Silers Bald are now poised to bring their music to a larger audience.

"God has given us so much in the past year," said Laura Story, who plays upright bass and piano for the band. "Some people sing about nothing, but we sing about what is most important in our lives."

Along with Story, Silers Bald consists of members Holly Anderson (vocals), Warren Bazemore (guitar, vocals), Jason Jacobs (drums, percussion), Marcus Myers (violin), Alan Reed (bass, guitar) and Shane Williams (guitar vocals). This large ensemble provides for a unique sound that manifests itself into beautiful music and spiritual songs.

"Music is something that we all have in us," Williams said. "We like singing about God and Jesus."

Silers Bald started out as a folk duo last year at USC. They got their name from a ridge on an Appalachian Trail that is characterized by its view and remote location.

As more members joined the band, Silers Bald's music expanded to what they now describe as "folk roots with a rock feel."

The music on *climbing* incorporates that trademark sound with piano-driven

melodies, acoustic songs and several instrumental tracks. According to Read, the CD is the perfect representation of the band's musical and personal journey.

"We are very pleased with this CD," he said. "It is a good reflection of where we are at this point in our lives."

The success of Christian acts like Jars of Clay and DC Talk have opened the minds of those who have trouble taking Christian music seriously.

Though negative attitudes still exist about the music, the future looks promising for bands who sing about the Word of God.

"Christian bands have become more popular in the past couple of years," Jacobs said. "ROCK 93.5 FM and other radio stations are playing DC Talk and Caedmon's Call, and we are along for the ride."

In addition to their music, Silers Bald said they dedicate themselves to their mission statement, which reads: "Ministering to those who know, and witnessing to those who do not."

This creed speaks of their desire as a Christian band to use their music as a way of spreading the word about God and the teachings of the Bible. It is a ministry complete with three anointed speakers, a management staff and a devoted following.

"I hope that people realize that we chose to use our gift of entertainment to change people forever," Read said. "The music is like one-on-one songs about


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Any student registered in UNIVERSITY 101 will automatically be issued a USC computerid ("userid") for electronic mail and Internet (text only) access on the CMS system. Any other student may request a userid in 1 of 2 ways:

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Via the Services Center, Computer Services:

Stop by the Services Center (lobby of Computer Services building, corner of Sumter and Blossom Streets) with your USC student id and request a userid. Services Center staff can also check to see if a userid already exists in your name, and reset your password if necessary. Requests for new ids are processed by the next day; password resets are immediate. The Services Center will be open Saturday, August 16, from 10 a.m.-3 p.m., and on Sunday, August 17, from 10 a.m.-8 p.m. Regular Fall semester hours begin Monday, August 18 (M-Th, 8 a.m. - 8 p.m., Fridays, 8 a.m. - 6 p.m., & Sundays 3:30 p.m. - 8 p.m.). Call 777-1800.

The Services Center, Thomas Cooper Library, and other computing labs on campus provide access to the CMS system so you can check your mail and surf the net. You can also access CMS from home via modem, from networked residence halls (see the note below), and via the Internet. The CMS Internet hostname is: vm.sc.edu (connections require a 3270 version of telnet, available from the Services Center at no cost). Refer to the address at the bottom of this flyer for more details.

NOTE: USC provides students with free access to the Internet via the University's CMS system. CMS is a text-based system. Your CMS account will allow you email, text-based WWW access, access to Usenet newsgroups, and FTP/telnet capabilities. Students in residence halls connected to the campus network should refer to the Computer Services Networking & Desktop Support guide (http://nds.csd.sc.edu/guides/dorm/) for info on applying for connection to the USC network and equipment requirements. A campus network connection will allow direct Internet connections from student-owned systems, and graphic access to the Internet. USC Computer Services does not presently offer off-campus PPP/SLIP access to the Internet (to allow you to use graphic applications such as Netscape or Internet Explorer via modem), although negotiations are in progress to provide this service to the USC community at a reduced fee. For information on ISP providers you can contract with individually, refer to the SCIWAY South Carolina Internet Service Providers page (http://www.sciway.net/isp_index.html). Additionally, public labs on campus will provide you with access to graphic web browsers (refer to the USC Computing Labs webpage (http://www.sc.edu/csd/labtable.html) for more details on public labs with network access).

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
The Services Center also distributes software to facilitate dialup access to the CMS system from off campus, and virus protection software at no cost to students. Call 777-1800 or come by for details.

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
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
