UVa knocks Carolina from NCAA Tournament

South Carolina's men's soccer team lost to Virginia 1-0 Sunday afternoon at UVa's Klockner Stadium in Charlottesville, Va., in the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

The loss ends Carolina's season at 16-5. The Cavaliers improve to 16-3-3 and will face Stanford, a 3-1 victor over San Diego, in the quarterfinals next weekend

Virginia scored the lone goal of the match at the 12:42 mark when Sheldon Burns collected the ball from nine yards out, turned and shot, squirting the ball past USC goalkeeper Henry Ring.

This was the fourth meeting between the Cavaliers and Gamecocks, and the first since UVa downed USC 2-0 in the 1993 national championship game for its third consecutive title and fourth in five years.

The Cavs and Gamecocks first met in 1989, also in the NCAA Tournament. In that game, the Cavaliers won 1-0 in overtime in the quarterfinals at Charlottesville. The following year, the two played to a 1-1 tie in the final game of the Coca-Cola Classic there.

Two cards were handed out in Sunday's match, both to Gamecock players. Jonas Myllenberg collected a yellow card in the 65th minute and Ring was given a red card in the 83rd minute. Matt Landman was substituted for Ring after the incident.

Virginia outshot the Gamecocks 11-10. Ryan O'Neill had four shots for the Gamecocks, while freshman Joey Worthen had three.
