

Adam Everett started all 61 games as an N.C. State freshman before transferring to USC when Ray Tanner was hired after the 1996 season. He played for Team USA in 1997 and was a *Baseball America* All-American in 1998 before being drafted by the Boston

Red Sox in the first round of the 1998 major league draft.

Everett won the Taylor McEntire Most Valuable Player award after leading the Gamecocks to a 44-18 record and a berth to the Atlantic Regional at Coral Gables, Fla. The Gamecocks were knocked out of the re

gional by the North Carolina Tarheels. Everett was also one of three Gamecocks named to the All-SEC team in

1998. joining teammates Mike Curry and Kip Bouknight.

Everett was traded to the Houston Astros in the 1999 off-season for out fielder Carl Everett. Everett is on the Astros' 40-man roster and will get the opportunity to battle for a spot on the major league roster in spring training

Hank Small is the most prolific power hitter in Gamecock history.

In 1975, his 19 home runs and 66 RBIs led USC to their first College World Series. USC was defeated by Texas 5-1 in the championship game.

Small was a All-American i 1974 and 197 and was signed b the Atlanta Brave after his senio season.

He led his AAA team in home runs and was the International League's MVP, but he got only four at bats with the Braves in 1978 – the only action he saw in the majors.

Small holds the Gamecocks' career home run record with 48 and is a member of the

USC Athletic Hall of Fame. In Small's time at USC,

the Gamecocks compiled a 150-45-1 record. Small compiled a 354

Small compiled a .354 career batting average, placing him seventh on the USC all-time list.

He is also third all-time in RBIs with 184 and second in total bases with 433.
