
Earl Bass was the ace on the Gamecock tea that was the 1975 College World Series runnerup to the Texas Longhorns.



In addition to being named second team All-America quarterback in football, Jeff Grantz set school fielding records at both his positions in baseball.

In 1974 while playing second base, he led the Game-cocks with an average of .987 (103 putouts, 122 assists, 3 errors). In the shortstop position, Grantz averaged .971 in 1976 with 48 putouts, 84 assists and 4 errors.

Grantz was chosen by the Baltimore Orioles in the fifteenth round out of high school. Instead, he came to Carolina, belted 10 homers and batted .287 as a sophomore and the club's lead-off man.

He was second on the team with 30 stolen bases and only committed three errors at second base.

By the end of his USC career in 1976 he was inducted into the South Carolina Athletic Hall of Fame for his overall accomplishments on the football and baseball fields.
