and hole in the terrain; the dual shock control works nicely here. The game has had a major overhaul in the geography and

background area. The geographical features can be so stunning you find yourself driving around just looking at the mountains, trees and water. The music accompanying the action has also been re-worked. Now you have some pretty good techno and rock beats as you try to bob and weave past the police and other smugglers trying to intercept you.

There are a total of three mission-oriented levels in the game. If that isn't your thing, the two-player games are fun. You can ram your friend when he's right next to his goal and send his car toppling down a hill—just make sure he doesn't punch hard or you'll pay for it. Angel Studios has come a long way with this game, and they have a lot of potential.
