

It was downhill from there, as the Gamecocks totaled no rushing yards, compared to LSU's 263 yards.

"Coach had us prepared, and we just didn't come out to play how we're supposed to," offensive lineman Jeff Barnes said. "You've got to go in week-in-weekout and try to dominate the front. We weren't able to that this week."
