their efforts as the first step to withdrawing entirely from Iraq. "Before you know it, the

entire country is going to stand up and say 'bring our troops home now," said Wade Fullmer of Military Families Speak Out.

Some members of the bus tour have a different approach to dealing with differing opinions.

"If you're for us or against us we want you to show up. We want people to talk about it," Zappala said. "It seemed like it fell off the radar there for a while. We've brought meaning back."

Some of the speakers were most angered not with opposition, but with phrases such as "support our troops."

"Our soldiers suffer and die because of the WMD lie." Fullmer said.

The tour has three sections: the central tour, the northern tour and the southern tour. The tour will end in Washington, D.C., on Wednesday. An antiwar protest is scheduled Sept.

"The people who are going to change it are not on that (pointing to the audience) side of the podium," Cuniglio said.


Although he offered no promises, Pastides hinted at possibly attracting South Carolina's computer store.




