USC, Claflin to study disease discrepancies

USC and Claflin University in Orangeburg will study disparities in the incidence of AIDS and cancer with a fiveyear, \$7.5 million federal grant.

One study will explore why the human papillomavirus persists in some women while it lasts only a short time in others. The virus is a precursor to cervical cancer.

The grant also will provide for new fellowships and research internships on both campuses, a public health research seminar series and a post-baccalaureate program in public health at USC.

The community-based research project is the third such partnership between a major research institution and a historically black college in South Carolina.

A partnership between the Medical University of South Carolina and South Carolina State University focuses on metabolic syndrome, studying physical activity and nutrition and their relationship to health disparities in cancer, diabetes and cardiovascular disease.



Sanford, complainant call S.C. island home

A Time magazine article this week calling Gov. Mark Sanford one of the nation's three worst chief executives might have left him feeling like a neighbor was badmouthing him.

Rumsfeld hits back with Clinton-era slant

Defense Secretary Donald H. Rumsfeld on Tuesday joined the Bush administration's attack on Iraq war critics, quoting Clinton administration officials who contended in the late 1990s that former Iraqi leader Saddam Hussein was a security threat to the United States and its allies.

At a Pentagon news conference, Rumsfeld noted that the Iraq Liberation Act, passed by Congress in 1998, said it should be U.S. government policy to support efforts to remove the Saddam regime from power. He noted that President Bill Clinton signed the act and ordered four days of bombing in December 1998.

Princess, commoner get hitched in Tokyo

TOKYO — Wearing a simple white dress and pearls, Japan's Princess Sayako bid farewell to palace life Tuesday to wed a Tokyo city employee in a low-key ceremony marking the first time that an emperor's daughter has married a commoner.

Under Japanese law, Sayako, the daughter of Emperor Akihito and Empress Michiko, lost her royal status by marrying, and will now live the life of a taxpaying commoner married to Yoshiki Kuroda, without her generous palace allowance.

To prepare for the dramatic shift to commoner status, Sayako has taken driving lessons and practiced shopping at supermarkets.

Sayako and Kuroda were childhood acquaintances, but their romance began two years ago at a tennis party thrown by Prince Akishino, one of Sayako's brothers.
