It is proposed to charter the fair association and raise sufficient funds to make it a lasting and permanent institution. A charter has been applied for and as soon as it arrives books of subscription will be opened and the real work begun. This year the Fair will be held early in Oct. after the rainy season is past so as to insure good fair days. It is also proposed that new, and novel, features will be introduced. One of the new features which will prove very unique and exciting will be a sham battle and attacking and burning of a fort. A part of another day will be set apart as Clow's day.

In fact there will be showed into those three days of the Fair more real fun and genuine harmless amusement than ever seen or enjoyed at any county Fair ever held in South Carolina. The management also hope to be able to erect seats at vacant places if possible for the use of woman and children and the weary in general so that all can see the sights and rest at the same time.

As soon as the charter arrives from Columbia we will publish for the benefit of our readers a general statement as to the plans and purposes of organization but we simply wish at this time to let the public know that the officers of the Fair are already at work and that great things may be expected of them between now and the time of the holding of the Fair next fall.

Some Fertilizer Tips.

Don't use less than 600 pounds to the acre. Authorities say that when you use less you are impoverishing your soil. Where less than six hundred pounds to the acre is used it acts as a stimulant and takes more plant food from the soil than it adds to it, but where you put more to the acre you are adding more than you take from it and in that way gradually improving your land. If you will notice the progressive money-making farmers in any community are those who put in fertilizer the heaviest.

Use a complete fertilizer at some stage of the cultivation of your crop. A complete fertilizer consists of phosphoric acid, ammonia and potash. Phosphoric acid gives a quick growth. When a plant is grown it ripens; when a cotton-boll is ripe it opens. Phosphoric acid also develops the seeds and cotton seed are valuable. By thoroughly developing the seed each year you can improve your seed.

Ammonia gives size to the plant, the stalk, the leaves and the bolls.

Potash develops lint and gives strength to the stalk. It also enables your crop to withstand a drouth better. It prevents rust and blight and the other diseases that cotton is liable to have.

There are three kinds of ammoniates—animal, vegetable and mineral. Your fertilizer should have all these three kinds of ammoniates in it. As one exhausts another comes in. By having the three you have a fertilizer that will feed and nourish the plant from the time it sprouts until the crop is ready to be gathered.

Nitrate of soda is a valuable ammoniate. In the first place it enables you to get a good stand of cotton and with seed as scarce as they are this year, that may be a very important point with you. Then it starts the plant off in a healthy condition so it will grow.

Agricultural authorities and experiment stations unite in recommending a fertilizer which is practically identical to our 8-4-4 goods for the loamy lands in this section, and where the lands are darker, 9-3-3 or 8-3-3 are especially profitable. The loamy lands require potash and the 8-4-4 and 10-4-4 furnish it in the quantities needed.

Ammoniates are quickly dissolved when there is much moisture. Some expert farmers recommend 10-4; 10 per cent. phosphoric acid and 4 per cent. potash, or a 10-6, 10 per cent. phosphoric acid and 6 per cent. potash when you bed up your land and when you plant your crop, as phosphoric acid and potash do not leach when the rains are heavy, but stay in the ground where they are taken up by the plant as plant food. Then when your crop is up, during the cultivation they recommend top dressing or side dressing with a complete fertilizer containing phosphoric acid, ammonia and potash. If this plan is adopted you will cultivate your crop under ideal condition so far as fertilizer is concerned.

The Anderson Phosphate and Oil Company has made a study of the fertilizer needs of the soils in this section and recommend their 10-4, 10-6, 8-3-3, 9-3-3, 8-4-4 and 10-4-4 as being especially adapted to these soils.
